Last month we announced we'd reprint a portion of Clarence C. Converse's discourse on Yachting etc. in Erie Bay prior to the year 1888, here goes:

ERIE'S BAY
IT'S YACHTS AND ENJOYMENTS
BY CLARENCE C. CONVERSE

Erie's beautiful bay lies about seventy feet below the surface of the mainland, like a crystal mirror framed in green. The rocking yachts ever seem to render willing obiesance to its rare charms.

As 'tis said of the strawberry: Doubtless God could have made a more beautiful bay; yet where on this round world is there one, surpassing it in those elements of aqueous purity, grace of outline and scenic variety, which together form so perfect a picture as is spread out here at our city's feet.

The heart of the Yachtsman thrills with delight at so glorious a sight, and he falls in love involuntarily with our goodly city; and on making it his home, is ready to exclaim, with the poet of the sacred writ, "My lines are fallen in pleasant places", his only marvel being that so few of Erie's citizens avail themselves of its splendid bay privileges.

That our bay is not lacking altogether in devotees of aquatic enjoyment, is evidenced by the presence on it of the schooner-yacht "Wanderer", built here and owned by H.R. Barnhurst; the Schooner-yacht "Caprice" (Ed & Jack take note) owned by Mr. J. Goodwin; the sloop-yacht "Dart" owned by Mr. George Carroll; The sloop-yacht "Madge" owned by Mr. C. Wise; the smack-rigged yacht owned by Mr. G. Baker, and the sloop yacht "Mallard" owned by the writer.

Many other small craft help to make up the Bay's pleasure fleet.

The untimely wrecking of Mr. F. H. Ball's schooner-yacht "Corsair" robbed Erie of one of the swiftest boats on Lake Erie.

Mr. Ball's loyalty to the grand sport of yachting has led him to assure his brother yachtsmen that he will early replace the "Corsair" with a schooner-yacht of equal elegance of model and speed of movement.

Erie yachtsmen are a lively set of sailors, with a genuine love for----

"A wet sheet and a flowing sea,
A wind that follows fast,
And fills the white and rustling sail,
And bends the gallant mast."

In addition to Erie's winged pleasure-boats we have steam yachts: the "Mystic", Hon. W. L. Scott's private yacht; the Harbormaster's government yacht: the "U.S.S. Michigan's" two launches; the steamer "Knobloch", capable of carrying 225 passengers; the "White", capable of carrying 150 passengers; the "Barnhurst", capable of carrying 175 passengers; the "Sutton", carrying 75 passengers; and the "Burch" carrying 50 passengers.

In addition to these boats there are three fleets of cat-rigged (Hear-hear--Ed) sail-boats, kept for hire by their respective owners, Messrs. Knobloch, Skivington and Paasch; and never a good sailing breeze on the Bay escapes being utilized by some or all of them.

The Bay is little used by oarsmen, though Dr. Harvey and John Welsh are enthusiastic lovers of the oar, and can handle it in a masterly manner.

No greater Bay-delight can be afforded the oarsman than a pull across it and into the chain of Penninsula ponds, where spooney lovers can gather heaps of pond lilies, to deck their naiad queens withal and imagine themselves in the midst of the primeval simplicity which man's rude hand has not marred; back to those days when dusky, flashing-eyed maidens and painted chieftans made love in those still flower decked waters.

"With the exception of one Saturday afternoon early in January, ice boating has been blah!
