### AUXILIARY RACING FLEET NEWS

Interest in "Big Boat" sailing has been at a new high during the 1968 season. Participation in all races has exceeded most anything we have witnessed over the past years. In addition we have seen a slow development of the "small big boat" class, known as the MORC (Midget Ocean Racing Class) fleet.

Most of the season is now behind us and when this reaches print only one race, the 3rd. and last of the Fall series will remain to be sailed on Sunday, Sept.22nd. The starting gun is at 2:00 p.m. The start, off the Club will be a thrilling sight, and can best be witnessed from

the outer end of the West Dock.

The Bay Races are run on a once or twice around basis, depending on the wind. Surprises are not uncommon when the finish line is approached

and a change in course length is suddenly announced.

This year the Interstate night race developed its share of the unusual. Most outstanding, the U. S. Coast Guard offered their services in looking after our boats. At their request we supplied a list of the boats participating to the Fairport Coast Guard station. When the last boat was over the starting line the committee boat verified to the Coast Guard picket boat on hand, that all sail-boats had started. A report to the Erie Coast Guard station verified that all sail-boats had crossed the finish line and reported in.

The one boat that "reported in" was quite a sight to see. The Victoria, one of the largest of our fleet had all her sail's ripped to shreds, and these were stuck in the sail tracks on the masts. A sudden squall was responsible and there was little the crew could do about it.

The same squall gave the committee boat "Gizmo" a hard time and the

anchor dragged.

Were we surprised to see the finish line flag proceeding into the wind right by the boat. Certain contestants bearing down on the finish line were also surprised when the flag disappeared behind the committee

boat-what to do-where to go?

One member of the fleet decided that a taller mast would give him an advantage over his changed handicap, so the Kahili mast was raised eight feet. How the boat finishes way ahead of the rest of the fleet. However, when the figuring is done and over, the "corrected time" didn't seem to give the improvement hoped for, according to the record.
