SMALL SAILBOAT RACING NEWS

It has been suggested by one of our newer racing sailors that each month in this column we include a small informative item on RACING PROCEDURE.

The first thing the committee needs is the class and the number of your boat and the skipper's name. This is usually given us simply by sailing close to the committee boat and hailing us. Secondly, you will want to know the order of start and the course you are to sail. STAY CLOSE to the committee boat to receive your racing instructions.

SOME IMPORTANT FLAGS AND SIGNALS TO REMEMBER

(a) 10 minute warning gun - white signal, (b) 5 minute warning gun - black signal, (c) 1st class start - repeat of black signal and gun, (d) other class starts - repeat of black signal and gun in 5 minute increments.




































FLOATING BOAT SHOW
