LET'S HAVE A SAFE 1970 SEASON

Many of us are deeply concerned over the lack of parental responsibility when it comes to children around water. It is indeed shocking to see so many small children playing on or around stall areas WITHOUT LIFE JACKETS! We, as parents, should not give in to the feeble complaints that a life jacket is "uncomfortable" or that "the other kids aren't wearing them". Set the rule and enforce it: If you do not know how to swim and swim reasonably well...wear a life jacket when on or near the water. In many instances this rule will serve as enough incentive to encourage a small child to take swimming lessons. If you own a boat and anticipate small children aboard at any time during the season...invest in a couple of extra children's life jackets and INSIST that they be used! Furthermore...do not leave a child unattended when around water. Always make certain that there is an adult nearby who knows how to swim in case of an emergency.

We hope this message is taken seriously and heeded, for there is nothing more pathetic than the sight of the rescue squad trying to save the life of a child!

Our Vice Commodore, George Sipple is no newcomer to the yachting world. As a boy he grew up at the West Side Motor Boat Club located at the foot of Cherry Street, learning the skills of boating on his father's 20' inboard.

In 1936, as a typical yachtsman, George moved up to a 26 footer, "Carol Ann". However, the scarcity of gasoline during the war years forced "Carol Ann" to dry dock. Following the war, George returned to the water in an 18' Chris, "Heidi Ann", and joined our friends over at the Presque Isle Yacht Club, then located on the Peninsula.

Eventhough being one of the original members of PYC, George chose to become a member of the EYC in 1950, bringing with him his 26' Chris Craft Sportsman, Heidi Ann II.

It only took our Vice Commodore two years to realize that the needed more room, so "Heidi Ann III" pulled in to the EYC basin. This 29' Chris, semi-enclosed, cruiser boasted a pair of 145 HP engines which made her the fastest boat in the bay, a distinction she held for a long time.




























HANGING FROM THE YARD ARM

























VIEWS FROM THE CROW'S NEST













ERIE YACHT CLUB ANNUAL REGATTA - 1970

The Erie Yacht Club will host the Annual Regatta, which this year is our ninth, on June 6th and 7th.

Through the cooperative efforts of your Officers, the Board of Directors and the Regatta Committee, a gala weekend has been planned for you and your family. This year, Regatta Weekend begins Friday evening, June 5th with the Icebreaker Party starting at 5:00 p.m.

The main features of Regatta Weekend are:

- 1) The Happy Hour on Friday, June 5th, starting at 5:00 p.m. Your choice of three prepared cocktails @ 65¢ each, or draft beer by the glass or the pitcher will be featured all evening.
- 2) A special, six-item Regatta Weekend menu is being offered for the evening meals, and will be served as complete dinners for family dining. The various items range from a hamburg or hot dog dinner, spaghetti dinner, through a selected line of fish dinners to a sumptious surf and turf dinner.
- 3) A Fish Derby will be held on Saturday, June 6th, for the 3 to 12 year old youngsters. Starting time for the Derby is 2:00 p.m. and will run for two hours. The youngsters can officially register on Friday evening or on Saturday up to Derby time. Prizes will be awarded. All entrants for the Derby must:
 - a. Bring their own fishing poles, line & hook; we will provide bait.
 - b. Have a life-jacket! The younger children, who cannot swim, must wear a life-jacket and be accompanied by a parent.
- 4) A Junior Dance for the teenagers will be held Saturday, June 6th in the Canoe House from 8 'til 11 p.m. Refreshments will be served and the dance will be chaparoned (it is entirely possible that this dance is the beginning of things to come for the teenage group at EYC). A very fine Junior Dance Committee and a Junior Committee are working on plans for music by a local group and decorations for the Canoe House. The dance will be for members' teenage children (and one guest, who must be of the opposite sex). The dance will be free. However, to fund this event, a 50-50 drawing will be conducted during the month of May.

5) The Galley is offering for the Saturday evening meal an extra special addition to the Regatta Weekend Menu - a prime ribs of beef dinner.

The Galley is also open on Saturday and Sunday, for a light sailorstype breakfast and lunch.

We also are going to have a Regatta. The invitations are being prepared at this time. The Regatta is a series of three races for Thistles, Stars, Lightenings, Sunfish, Fireballs, Rhodes Bantam and a MD.R.C. Fleet, which is an addition in the 1970 Regatta.

The Trophy presentations are scheduled for 2:00 p.m. on Sunday, June 7th.

Regatta Weekend is shaping up as the largest, best organized family activity to happen at EYC in many years. BECOME INVOLVED! "Involvement is the name of the game", says Jack Bierley. Something is planned to please every Yacht Club member, his family and guests.
