Hope by this time Dick Swanson has his new Catalina 30' sailboat. A little late for this year, but something to anticipate for next.



### RULES GOVERNING USE OF E Y C BASINS

In the past few months I have enjoyed the pleasure of having several visiting yachtsmen tell me what a beautiful place we have at the Erie Yacht Club. And generally I can luxuriate in this feeling with them. We have no consequential problems with governmental bodies, with our neighbors, with finances nor with a rundown house. We are in good shape, thanks to the attention of present officers and the heritage from their predecessors. In fact what problems the Directors of your Club get involved with seem to come from the inter-relationships between members who must share a common facility. Like members of a family, we don't always agree on the way to use our common property or we sometimes fail to consider the effect of what we do, on the next "guy". One such situation concerns the maneuvering of our boats in the Club's mooring basin. On weekends, in the peak of the season, we almost need a traffic director to avoid collisions. A recent incident prompted your Officers to look at the rules governing such situations.

The applicable rules comprise, the Motor Boat Act, the Pilot Rules (Coast

Guard publication C.G. 172) Erie Yacht Club's "House and Ground Rules" and a good measure of common sense and courtesy. At the request of the Officers, I have put together the pertinent information which hopefully will minimize incidents between maneuvering boats.

## RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF THE ERIE YACHT CLUB BASINS

- 1. The Erie Yacht Club's basins serve as means for entrance and egress to or from the dock and launch areas. They are not to be used as play areas, for training nor for touring around the enclosure. From large vessels, it may be impossible to see a small boat which is close aboard and such small boats put themselves in considerable jeopardy when using the basin as such.
- Vessels backing out of stalls are burdened and must wait for vessels underway.
- 3. A boat entering the basin from Presque Isle bay has right of way over an exiting vessel, where such right needs to be exercised in the narrow entrance.
- Powered vessels shall generally maintain a port to port aspect (see Pilot Rule 17) and sailing vessels shall adhere to Pilot Rule 16.
- 5. Sailing vessels, under sail only, have right of way, subject to the 1965 amendment to the Motor Boat Act (also Pilot Rule 19) with respect to narrow channels.
- All vessels, at nightime, must carry the proper lights within the basin as soon as put underway. Pilot Rule 2.
- 7. The operation of any boat at a speed which creates damaging wake is forbidden. You are legally responsible for damage, to other boats, piers, or property on other boats, created by your wake.
- 8. Sometimes a disabled vessel must be towed in, come in on one engine ----or a large sailboat be sailed or coasted in. Obviously, simple courtesy requires everyone to stay clear of these troubled vessels.



## COMMODORE'S REPORT


