Dry sailboats must be kept on trailers and must have the 1976 sticker on their transom. Trailers which are left on the grounds and not identified will be towed away. We are not allowed to store the trailer on the grounds without the boat being stored on it daily.

Identification of boats and stalls should be put in the proper place. On the fore part of the mast on sailboats above the boot or cover, and on the window or windowshield of power boats.

If you have not been properly assigned a space or stall please ask myself or Bill Ambro, in the office, for this proper assigning. Boats placed in position on ramps without this assignment will be removed.

We have purchased new rail and are attempting to make repairs as soon as possible on some of our older docks. We are also putting power to the full East Dock and partially along the North Wall along with water. This work is being done right now. We would appreciate any co-operation and assistance we can have with the workmen in making our work easier. Do not leave boxes or equipment around which might be in our way while we are doing this installation work

We also expect to furnish good white paint this year and would hope that you consider furnishing your own paint brushes and rollers and each of you painting your catwalk and the area in front of your dock. We will try to dress up the whole club in this fashion and with a little cooperation we can do it.

Attention all sailboat owners. In welcoming the club's new committee boat to her berth, it was voted at the last meeting of the IOR fleet to accept the long awaited Performance Handicap Racing Rule as a new class to race with the IOR

boats. Under PHRF, all cruising type sailboats with inboard or outboard engines, 20' or larger, may rate and race in the PHRF fleet with the IOR fleet. If your boat has a IOR, MORC, CCA, or NAYRU certificate there is little effort in completing the PHRF rating application. Many of the standard sailing boats




