



COMMODORE'S REPORT

The winter we have just experienced has been a most difficult one for, I am sure, all of us. For our part, at the Erie Yacht Club, we have had the difficulty of an antiquated truck and plow, which continually broke down. We had to hire, at considerable expense, outside help to move our snow and keep the Yacht Club fire lanes open and the parking lots and roadways clear. The weather also caused the cancellation of our usually finest winter party, the Champagne Ball. This was rescheduled for Saturday, February 19th, and was, we are pleased to report, a fine success. Hopefully, other parties will be run on schedule. As we noted before, we have attempted to schedule one major event each month.

Your Board of Directors have approved the purchase of a new truck and plow, with a committee investigating the best buy for our needs. The weather also created some very unusual conditions in that it literally sheared off the 100 lb. railroad rails which are our supporting uprights for the catwalks and docks. Some 30 or 35 of these were broken off by this enormous force. We have pictures covering this damage and will show them to you.

Another example of the ice damage is, when the water and ice went down, it dropped almost three feet and tore our new conduit junction boxes right in half on the new M & N docks out on the north wall. The power was amazing, and the damage expensive. We have a great deal of work to do to get the docks ready for your use, but, hopefully, we will be on time. The ice may not melt until June.

The gate, you will notice, is not operable. It is simply frozen in. We gave up trying to break it loose daily, because it simply filled up with too much ice, and we gave up the ghost on this. As soon as we feel it is possible, we will make sure it is operational again.

We are in the process of interviewing and admitting the new applicants from Erie County only. Our membership is growing very fast, and, of course, our dock space is filled without any of these new additions. We still will not be able to take care of some members that we took in last year and the year before. Your Vice Commodore, Dick Waller, is doing a yeoman's job of sorting this out, and will have to make some positive shifts in order to fit us all in the available dock space. It is like putting two pounds of peanuts into a one pound bag.

Remember, your dining room is operating all week, please attempt to schedule one of your nights out each week at the Club. If anything, our rates are ridiculously low, and the special on Wednesday night, prime ribs at \$3.95, is a steal.

We had some weather related disasters, such as food which did not arrive in time for the "All You Can Eat Lobster Party", although as late as 4:00 PM that afternoon, it had been promised by phone. This got us into a little difficulty with our members, but, hopefully, by the time you read this, those members will have been taken care of. For this problem, we apologize, and we are making serious efforts to correct the situation.

The Ladies' Auxiliary is very active with monthly meetings, and they have recently purchased some beautiful silver service trays with their money, donating them to the Club for use on state events. For this, we thank them. These pieces include two sizes of trays, I think sixteen in all, and candelabra to go to the end of the tables. Under our good member, Lew Klahr, heading the committee, we are starting the Erie Yacht Club Curling Club. Our intention at this moment is to use bay ice, and we have slowly accumulated the knowhow and the information for this beginning through the good graces of a non-member, Bill Burroughs, formerly of Schenectady, and now of Erie. Through Bill, we have obtained 32 stones on loan to us for two years. These are worth about \$50.00 a piece, and they

come from the Duluth (Minnesota) Curling Club, through the National Curling Club Society of North America. In the United States alone, there are about 4000 of these curling clubs, and it is becoming a very popular and active sport, running about six months each year. It is a vigorous game and an excellent one for companionship. We hope you will take time to observe and learn and volunteer some help.

We have also appointed a Pool Committee under your Director Frank Knauer who is investigating the possibility of building a swimming pool for our members. He will come up with recommendations for size, location, style, price, and then the Board will be responsible for approving the project plans before submitting them to the membership for their consideration.

We have inaugurated the "Thursday Night at the Movies" at 8:00 PM through the good graces of George Sipple, and your Yacht Club Manager, Bill Ambro. They will have movies on Norway and Iceland shortly. We have had movies on curling and some old Yacht Club movies, so far. They are shown at 8:00 PM, Thursday nights, normally. If you take the time to come down for supper and watch the movies, we would love to have you, and you will enjoy this.

We regret to report that Red Wagner was taken sick last week, just before the Champagne Party, and we understand that he is very uncomfortable. Hopefully, we hope it will not be too serious, but, at this point, he wants no visitors.

We would like to thank Red and his good wife, Bernie, for their efforts on our behalf as Entertainment Chairmen. They have been doing an excellent job for us.

MEMBERSHIP

At the last annual membership meeting, we reported a total club membership of 727 persons, This represents an increase from the count reported in November, 1975. Those of you who have visited the Club recently may have noticed a goodly number of member candidates posted for consideration. That number exceeds the number of deaths and resignations recorded in the past year, so that our total membership roster will show an increase again when we

report to you in November, 1977. Obviously, we are approaching the time when we will be able to accept only that number of new members equal to resignations and deaths. Our dock facilities are already limited. Members accepted last year will be unable to obtain boat stalls in almost every instance. Bar and dining facilities are rarely limiting, and we especially need such trade in the winter months.

Expansion of the Club facilities is presently limited northward by the depth of the water, and because we are close to the Federal harbor border. Eastward is City property, and westward is privately owned land. Your membership in your Club becomes an increasingly valuable asset each year. This shortage situation is a national trend precipitated by the extraordinarily rapid proliferation of boating.

The Erie Yacht Club maintains seven classes of membership: Regular, boat owners; Associate, non-boat owners; Intermediate, ages 21 through 29; Senior, over 65 and 15 years a member; Special, unmarried widows of yacht owning members; Junior, ages 16 - 25 - parent not a member; Junior Family, ages 16 - 25 - parent a member.

The requirements for each of these classes are detailed in the Club's Constitution and By-Laws. Presently, member candidates apply by writing the Secretary a letter indicating their desire for membership. Likewise, transfers between classes of membership are handled by letter to the Secretary. Each acceptance or transfer must be approved unanimously by the Board of Directors at their regular monthly meeting. Should you have any question about membership matters, please consult an officer or the Club office.




