REAR COMMODORE'S REPORT VICE COMMODORE REPORT



The project to replace the concrete slab walkway with steel deck plate along the west ("B" & "C") docks has been completed. As slabs were removed, some areas of collapsing bulkhead were exposed. These were repaired. Replacement of the concrete walk with steel on the south ("F") and east ("G" & "H") docks will be coordinated with the yacht haul-out schedule. Wing dock rebuilding will be winter and early spring work.

During the last week of September, failure occurred at the bulkhead at the east and southeast sides of the entrance to the Yacht Club basin from the bay. As repair was beyond the capacity of our equipment and personnel, a contractor, Robert Rumball, has been engaged to do the job. This includes excavating behind the bulkheads, pulling them back into position and providing suitable anchors to prevent any recurrence. Bulkhead problems existing at "A" and "H" docks will be handled by the Yacht Club work force.

Cradles are currently being unstacked and dispersed along the east and north Club perimeter. The first yachts have already been hauled and stored. It is indeed a dismal time. Some of the cradles are in obvious need of repair or replacement. Have you surveyed yours yet? Will it survive until April 1979?

To minimize a repeat of the last January dock catastrophe, the outboard end of each walkway will be raised and placed on top of the outer supporting rail. All slip occupants are requested to remove from the walkways and support rails mooring lines, chains, cables, tires, fenders, wire, hose, etc. Considerable amounts of the damage to walkways was caused by the ice interaction with the items attached to the walkway structure. Our work force has been instructed to clear all extraneous items from each walkway prior to outboard end elevation. Your cooperation in minimizing their workload will be appreciated.

A new bronze and steel worm gear drive for the mast hoist has been ordered. This together with recent changes to the crank handle (it now rotates) should reduce the physical effort required for spar replacement and removal. Also as the result of a suggestion from a safety conscious member, a short cable has been installed to prevent the dropping of the moveable boom, in case of hoist cable failure



Since the summer rush is over, Bob Rulli and Chef Mike are planning to introduce new food ideas for both the lunch and dinner menus. Their recent International Night featuring Chinese food was a delight and an indication of many things to come. We hope you will continue to support both the Galley and the Lounge. If you haven't dined at the Club recently, do come and give us a try!

Many club house parties and functions are being planned on most weekends, and many weekdays have been reserved through New Year's. The Monte Carlo Nite and Octoberfest Parties were outstanding successes. The Entertainment Committee is to be congratulated on their fine work in planning these functions and carrying them to a successful conclusion.

The need for a new west entrance was very apparent, after the last two stormy winters, and as you can see, we are on our way with this project. It will be completed before the heavy weather sets in, and I'm sure that every one will enjoy the protection from the west wind when entering the club.

We suffered some mechanical set backs this summer with the breakdown of two air conditioning units. One necessitating a new compressor and the other a complete new unit. In addition to this, the life expectancy of the remaining equipment is limited. Unfortunately, the club has been faced with repairs in many areas, requiring the postponement of such improvements as renovation of the Dining Room and Porch. Hopefully, future outlays will be normal, permitting the planning and completion of these projects.

All in all, we hope that you feel, as we do, we have made the first step in giving you a Dining Room and Lounge that satisfies your desires for pleasurable dining and companionship. We look forward to seeing these areas continue to improve and expand.

On October 1st we suffered a significant loss. Delbert Miller, one of EYC's key personnel, because of health problems, retired. A competent craftsman in diverse fields (metal working, welding, pipefitting, carpentry, heavy equipment operation, dock fabrication and erection, you name it) he is already sorely missed. From my personal experience I found him to be one of the most versatile, conscientous, diligent and loyal individuals with whom I was ever associated. Fortun-

Reflecting back on the year, in January and February we first established a committee consisting of a representative from each fleet including: Chairman -Gordon Way; Class Boats - John Damcott; Morc - Ron Hamilton; Power Fleet - Gene Burkley; Racing Aux. - Bill Bloomstine; Jr. Sailing - Nat Reyburn; and Fishing Fleet - Hank Lorence. We discussed the improvements they needed, established priorities and proceeded to accomplish those priorities.

We solicited bids for landscaping and maintaining the grounds and selected a firm which has done an outstanding job this year. The erosion problem caused by the sewer line breaking last year presented many problems. After various meetings' with city officials we were successful in getting the erosion areas properly seeded.

In spite of the heavy snow fall this year our great grounds crew was able to keep the Club open throughout the winter months. Thanks to Marty and his staff.

In conjunction with the Pennsylvania Crime Commission we instituted a Property Identification Program, programs' wide-spread public exposure has apparently reduced pilferage at the Club.

We also initiated the Identification Pass Program to impliment the By-law changes that were made at the November meeting by the general membership allowing young adults access to the club grounds.

And finally, as a solution to the gate problem during the noon luncheon hour, we incorporated automatic controls alleviating member's and their guests difficulties entering and leaving the grounds.

I have thoroughly enjoyed working with the members as Fleet Captain and thank the nominating committee for placing my name on the ballot for Rear Commodore. (F.R.)

Seven different boats received 1st overall, eleven different boats taking 2nd overall and thirteen different boats taking 3rds. 

NOMINEE FOR DIRECTOR REAR ADM. CHAS. CURTZE

Rear Admiral Curtze bought Ken Eckerd's WILD DUCK 14-foot international dinghy, No. 9, "Canvas Back" and became a Junior Erie Yacht Club member in 1926. (Dues were \$5.00 a yera). With Durk Braggins and Chuck Schauble he helped with a lot of Club maintenance work under the direction and conning of Rip Sawdey that no one else could be hired to do -- even if pay were promised. Once in a while the juniors got working rides to Dover, but had to moonlight loading rumrunners to cadge a drink.

1928, as a Rotary Club exchange son, he sailed Oslo Fjord and the Oresund off Copenhagen in "Sonder" boats and instituted a policy of visiting every ship or yacht building yard

within reach.

He became a naval officer with shipbuilding and naval arch-

itecture his specialty.

Was building way superintendent for submarines in Portsmouth, New Hampshire after which he spent the war years in the Pacific patching holes, general ship repairs, and salvage; saw clubs mostly from a bar stool or dance floor.

Returned from a NATO job in Europe to become Repair and Shipbuilding Superintendent at the Norfolk Navy Yard, leading to three years as the Head of the Shipbuilding Division

Bureau of Ships in Washington.

His three years as the Pacific Fleet Maintenance Officer gave him the opportunity to have a drink in more Officers, Racquet, Cricket, Turf, Country, and Yacht Clubs than he can remember.

Then back to the States to command (manage) Hunta's Point Naval Shipyard in San Francisco. Running the number two Officers Club in the Bay Area against the political opposition of the restauranteurs, bar keeps and press of San Francisco was more demanding than building the ships HALSEY and MAHAN in an 8,000 man shipyard.

Finally to Washington as the No. 2 man in the Navy's Bureau of Ships from which he retired in 1965 to return to

Erie in 1968.

The rest, including building "Thule", you already know.

It should be apparent that Charlie Curtze's only experience is largely as a consumer of Club services and observer of club members, their problems and foibles.

He admits the answers, although obvious to members, aren't necessarily so to a director.

I am Henry T. Lorence. I am 59 years of age and a life long resident of Erie, having attended local schools.










The problem exists because of difficulty in identifying the member responsible for the charges either through failure of the member to sign the "chit" or because our employees marked the "chit" with the wrong name. The frequency increases each time we have a new employee or when extra help is provided for parties.

You will appreciate the situation when you realize our roster lists three B. Johnson's and six Millers not to mention the Smiths and Jones nor the many father-son combinations.

Members are rightfully irritated when bills are submitted for charges they did not incur and it is costly to bill two or more people for the same item, to research signatures for correctness; or to call in employees to describe the member.

We believe we can avoid these mistakes and bill correctly the first time by asking the member to sign the check (with his number) on his arrival and note the drinks he wishes. The bartender will add subsequent drink orders. Dining room checks may be returned to the waitress to record your meal order. This will avoid wrong billing.
