VICE COMMODORE'S REPORT



The fall season has created an air of urgency at the Yacht Club. The month

of September saw little activity towards the preparation for winter. However, the magic of October has produced a steady stream of boats making their way to storage, keeping Marty on a dawn to dusk schedule. Providing the weather cooperates, and Marty and the crane perservere we will all be under cover before the snow flies. We can then look forward to reversing the whole process in a few months.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the boating membership for their patience and understanding; particularly, those who were unable to obtain the dock assignments they would have preferred. There were circumstances at times which prevented adequate assignments. Those of you who have not scheduled haul-out dates, I urge you to arrange for times at once. Please police the area in front of your dock, and remove all your dock lines when hauling out. Your cooperation will reduce the work load for the clean-up crew.

As long-time members depart or cease boating and are replaced by newer members the impression that begins to prevail is that the Erie Yacht Club will haul members' boats. This is not correct. The member hauls (or launches) his own boat and he alone is responsible. The Erie Yacht Club will furnish a crane operator and will locate the boat where circumstances indicate.

The member will bring his boat to the gasoline dock, will place it in the haulout well after the crane has been positioned for him, and will center the boat until lifted. He shall provide sufficient and able help to perform all this work. Once hauled the member and his helpers scrub the bottom, assist in setting in the cradle and do the final blocking at its resting place for the winter. If sufficient help is not provided, the operator, manager or Vice Commodore can refuse to haul or alternatively assign manpower to perform all necessary work which will be charged at going marina rates or actual cost if higher.

These conditions have had to be imposed because members who do not provide the necessary help delay the haulout of the next vessel and prolong the days

DECORATING COMMITTEE'S REPORT

The members of the decorating committee are pleased with the many favorable comments about the "new look" at the Club. Needless to say, we took on the challenge of redecorating the dining room knowing full well not everyone would be happy with the results. However, those in favor have been a significant majority which has been very gratifying.

There have been questions about the completion of the project. At this writing a work committee has plans for illuminating the trophy cases and finishing a few odds and ends such as hanging more of the trophies, relocating a light fixture and painting a storage closet for the ladies' auxiliary, etc. These are a few of the little finishing touches which don't make a big show but do take time.

The metal sailboat sculpture on the West wall, donated by the Ladies' Auxiliary, has been a source of great pleasure to all who frequent the club. Now the challenge is to find something for the East wall which will be equally fitting and beautiful. At present the budget will not encompass such a purchase. Maybe next year--if we find the right thing.

The budget voted by the board for this project was \$44,000. With much comparison shopping, good advice and no end of penny pinching we managed to: insulate and finish the East wall, close the West wall and install folding doors, complete the "Commodore's Corner" which was formed by this new wall, add ceiling beams, antique brass chandeliers and wall fixtures, and the necessary wiring and controls, cover the walls with a commercial weight vinyl grass cloth, paint the ceiling and door jams, stain and finish all new beams and moldings and purchase artificial plants. Probably the most striking change was the new dining room carpeting which we managed to extend through the lobby, hallway and office. All the dining room chairs have been recovered and padded as well as the lobby furniture. Still within the budget we have purchased one extra round table and two square ones which have not been delivered as yet. With the exception of a few small accessories yet to be decided upon the decorating committee is finished with its project.





These guards, due to their limited contact with the Club members, their families and friends and also due to the large membership cannot be expected to be acquainted with each and every.

Your cooperation and that of all our members in assisting these guards in performing their assigned duties will be appreciated. They are not discriminating. Even the Commodore has had to present an I.D.

It appears some members failed to notice the application form for boat slips and winter storage stipulated that no boats over 8 ft. long could be stored in the Club house basement. If you are one of such three, please remove your boat as soon as possible or the Club will do so charging the member the appropriate labor cost.

The same admonition applies to those sailboat masts less than 50 ft. long which are hung on the east end of the Clubhouse basement. Those under 50 feet should be stored at the west end of the main bay or off that bay to any side bay. Incorrectly stored masts will be relocated and the member charged. Unidentified masts will be moved outside.
