


Commodore's Report

I am sure this Spring is little different from years past along this Lake Shore. However, it does seem as though the weather improves just enough to make one eager to get the boats ready, then turns rotten on the days one wants to paint and varnish. But, as always happens, real Spring must come.



A most noticeable, and notable,

change has taken place in the Club House operation. The House Committee and the Staff have made a number of improvements and innovative changes in all areas. The menus have a wide variety of selections, the hours of service are expanded and will be available seven days a week. You may have a leisurely dinner with friends, or faster service if you are in a hurry. The dessert cart has been exceptionally well received. One tends to forget the cautions of Doctors and spouses when the desert cart arrives at the table. As an example, one of our members had a slice of walnut cake, then bought the whole cake. The Rear Commodore and his advisors are, again, to be commended. We are going in the right direction and intend to continue progress.

The Vice Commodore has had his hands full with the problems resulting from the weather damage to the marine facilities. Though the damage was very extensive, the cost was reduced by the inginuity of the staff and the use of our personnel to handle most of the work. A minifactory was set up at the picnic shelter. Of the 123 catwalks that were damaged 102 have been repaired. It is intended to remove the individual catwalks when maintenance is required. Some 85% of the members use berths with shared catwalks with no problems.

The Fleet Captain was faced with an immediate problem which required replacing the three 4000 gallon gas tanks. A new 12,000 gallon gas tank was installed, along with a 2,000 gallon diesel fuel tank. The east pump at the gas dock is for diesel fuel and the middle and west pumps are for gasoline.

Security has been increased. Uniformed guards man the entrance from 4 P.M. to 8 A.M. If the guard requests identification it must be provided. In time, the guards will become acquainted with the members and others who have the privileges of the Club. During the night hours the guards record the vehicles entering and leaving the

grounds. A guard will be assigned on the 8 AM to 4 PM shift when special events are scheduled. It is virtually impossible to totally police the entire area. There is access by water and around the fences. We must rely upon members and working staff to challenge any one whose presence is suspect. Trespass and use of the property by others than fees paying members is an infringement of the privileges of the members and will not be tolerated.

The roadway "up the hill" is a city street and we have no control over its use and maintenance. Because of many curves and the fact that it is very narrow, the road can be dangerous. A further problem is pedestrians, cyclists, and children playing on the hillside. Reducing speed and keeping to the proper side of the road are necessary to avoid accidents.

We are all looking forward to a great boating season. Hopefully, it will start soon.

Sorry that I had to be slightly late in getting the dock assignments posted. Many older members decided that this was the year to get back into boating and despite the so called recession, Reaganomics or whatever name you wish to attach, many of you had the wherewithal to purchase larger vessels. This of course creates the domino theory. Boats had



to be relocated with some that were allowed to come in from a mooring last year will find themselves back in the same position. Another situation that causes a bottleneck in this area is the failure of members to notify us of any changes.

You will find that the docks (catwalks) that were repaired will be much sturdier and the new box outer rails very stable. We also drove some of the wobbly posts down a little farther where possible. In the areas where some of you will have to share a catwalk, thanks to Wendel Sheldon and Ed Irvin, carpeting is available to pad the outer post and cable to string between shore and your outer post. It may be possible next year, if we get our land purchase out of the

way and time permits, that Jim may be able to upgrade the catwalk situation. Building a new catwalk from scratch costs in the area of \$5,000 to \$7,000. At present we are missing twenty one.

For those of you that occupy a mooring there will be no charge for dingy storage during the summer. Since the point system has been revised I felt that this is one courtesy that we could give to these occupants.

Please read your Dock Rules in regard to such matters as illegal occupancy of a dock (this must be cleared through the dockmaster, the club manager or myself), loaning of boats to relatives or friends, please read carefully page 6.4, paragraph 3 regarding your wake in the basin. I have found it necessary to assign some live aboard members in the area west of the entrance. They do not appreciate being shook up by discourteous boaters. Any complaints in this area will be dealt with by the board. Of course we all must follow the rules set forth in the Constitution, By-Laws, House Rules, Ground Rules and Dock Rules, I would like to mention once more an area that the Commodore had problems with last year. Only one or two members abused the rule set forth in the Constitution regarding commercial use of their vessels within the confines of the Yacht Club (R.E. Article VI, paragraph 4 of the Constitution).

I guess that is enough of my attempt to be officious. I have orders from my first mate that all equipment aboard deadline be put in proper working order and that she will leave the bay. Now if the weather would cooperate, I as well as you, can get our vessels superficially in shape to at least launch. Doug is being deluged with last minute launching dates keeping our crew on the run.









