Please bring a buddy to help. Have blocks and shoring ready at time of haul-out.

Remove all hoses, lines and electrical cords, tables, grills, etc. from dock. Allow yourself enough time to fill up with fuel and pump out your head before your scheduled time.

Non-toxic antifreeze should be used to winterize your boat and motor.

Make sure your cradle is in good condition before haul-out date.

Last haul-out date will be November 30. That will allow us time to winterize our equipment.
