Reflections on Enigma

Enigma came into being when Ken Eckerd and Clarence Murphy got into a conversation while sitting in the old Canoe House doorway. Ken said he would like to build a sailboat and Murphy agreed to ramrod the building. Murphy hired Chester A. Nedwideck, who had just left the firm of Charles Mower, to draw her plans. He had Prescott Wilson of New York furnish her sails – Pidgeon Hollow Spar for mast, booms, etc., and Universal for a 35-horse, four-cylinder engine. Herman Lund, of course, built her. Punk Avril, a good friend of Ken's and a super pattern maker made patterns for all her deck hardware – the chocks on her bow, the car on her anchor windlass – the jamb cleats – the main sheet traveler – pin rail etc.

Murphy ruled Herman with an iron hand. The planking was copper riveted over burrs and she was sanded by hand – no electric gadgets or automatic screwdrivers were allowed. When she came out she was supposed to be a "Plain Jane" but Ken's friends started to kibitz, so the canvas decks were laid up in teak and the Philippine britework became Honduras. The Harry Pidgeon spars were beautiful.

The galley had a Prestolite gas three-burner plate and a Shipmate coal stove which the later-day sailors saw fit to give to Dave Bierig and is now in his sail loft.

Grace was built by Herman from Charles Mower Designs – a 42'6" Ketch. I keep thinking she cost \$6,500. When she was sold, Durk (Braggens), Paddy (Padden) Panitke moved over onto Enigma – probably about 1935 as best as I can remember. As we had no home, Ken took us in.

In the fall of 1939 I was pumping gas at Sixth and Cranberry and a customer said he was putting a pattern shop together for Penn Union Electric at Fourth and State Streets. I told him about Punk Avril who was sailing *Enigma*. They knew each other and Punk got the job. Then I told Ken of *Blitzen's* big Jenny – *Blitzen* was a big cutter and her *Genoa* was a breakthrough sail.


Ken and I took a train to New York to see the shows (boat) and he okayed my buying the sail. This made *Enigma* a contender. During this time we amassed two hoists of winners' flags. I understand they have ended up in the garbage.

EYC Sailor Rolling Toward Georgia

With the addition of Rolling Rock Beer and Rocket 101 as sponsors, Laura Dunn's efforts to become the U.S. Olympian in the Women's Single-handed Division have received a major boost. Since her campaign was officially kicked off in December 1994, Laura has completed in three regattas. The first was the OYC Regatta held in Miami in January where Laura took second place behind Brazil's Olympic sailor. Her first place finish in the St. Petersburg S.P.O.R.T. (St. Petersburg Olympic Race Training) regatta held in late January helped solidify her place as a serious contender. Her competitors include Nancy Haberland, Taresa Davis, Diane Burton and Danielle Brennan (1994 Rolex Yachtswoman of the Year) of the USA. The OYC Regatta held on the Olympic course in Savannah was almost cancelled due to the weather. The first two days were cancelled with 35-knot winds and 10-foot seas which the 11-foot boats could not safely handle. The regatta was finally sailed in two days of very light and shifty winds and choppy seas, which apparently are common. Laura, after a discouraging first day, learned how to handle the boat in the conditions and had an excellent second day, finishing eighth overall and sixth American. A sailor from Germany won the regatta. With their official U.S. ranking in parentheses, the U.S. finishers were: Kim Logan, 1st (#1); Taresa Davis, 2nd (#5); Jane Kirk, 3rd (#3); Carrisa Harris, 4th (#7); Danielle Brennan, 5th (unranked); Laura Dunn, 6th (unranked). Finishers behind these women included #2-ranked Jennifer Coolidge and 6th-ranked Rebecca Harris. After this regatta, Laura was ranked 12th in the U.S. This was the first ranking regatta in which


The Clock

We became acquainted with the Erie Yacht Club's Ship's Clock many years ago when we had Sunday morning breakfasts at the Club. P/C Bill Behr made a ritual of going in the storeroom, retrieving a step ladder, positioning the ladder at the largest west window, climbing the ladder and winding the clock. He would then replace the ladder in the storeroom, come back into the Grill Room, order a beer and join Marj, Dee and me for breakfast. This went on religiously every Sunday for years.

This clock was presented to the Erie Yacht Club in 1920 by the Inter Lake Yachting Association. The inscription reads, "Presented To The Erie Yacht Club by The Visiting Yachtsmen of the Interlake Yachting Association, in Grateful Remembrance of a Most Hospitable Regatta July 11-17, 1920, May The Happy Hours You Gave Us Be Returned One Thousand Fold and Counted Here In Passing." It is solid brass. The movement is jeweled and was manufactured by the Chelsea Clock Company, very famous for its ships' clocks. Over the years it just wore out and finally had to be retired to the trophy case in the Yacht Club lobby. We finally decided this valuable heirloom did not deserve this kind of treatment. With Commodore John Ashby's permission, we had it completely restored by Filip Jewelry & Collectibles and the Chelsea Clock Company. It is now in the Grill Room for all to see and admire. We built a wall rack for lower-level mounting so P/C Bill Behr doesn't have to retrieve the large step ladder for his customary weekly ritual.

Laura has sailed a *Europe* dinghy. She needed to sail in at least five ranking regattas to receive any higher ranking. Her finishes and ranking have enabled her to be the fifth woman on the U.S. team representing the U.S. in the European championships.

Laura is extremely encouraged with her finishes to date, especially since she is new to the Europe dinghy. Although she sailed dinghies all her life, her first sail on the Europe was in January. The boat is sensitive and more complicated to sail than many dinghies. Laura feels she has more room for improvement than most of her competitors who have sailed this boat for several years. To quote from Gail Rosenke's article in Southwinds Magazine on the St. Petersburg Olympic Training Regatta, "Laura Dunn (US), winner of the Women's Europe Class, said, 'I just needed time on the boat." Dunn had been sailing the Europe dinghy for only four weeks prior to the regatta. This caused some consternation among her fellow competitors. Many of them have been sailing the Europe for a year or more. Everyone agreed that the *Europe* is a tricky boat to sail well-it has been called the "Little Finn" because it requires precise tuning of the rig plus strength and endurance from the sailor. Said Paul Cronin, a competitor's coach, "Laura just sailed smarter."

She has had little time to practice or be coached as she was completing her senior year at Tufts in Medford, MA. The culmination of Laura's college sailing career was being named All-American and also being voted Best New England Skipper by her sailing peers which include competitors from other schools.

Laura is officially representing the Erie Yacht Club in all of the Europe dinghy events including upcoming Kiel Week in Kiel, Germany and the European Championships in Malmo, Sweden. Hopefully she will be representing you at the 1996 Olympics in Savannah! Europe dinghy Olympic campaigns are extremely costly, with the boats costing approximately \$9,000 (most competitors have more than one boat) and coaching cost are approximately \$300 per day. She needs your encouragement and support! T-shirts may be purchased for \$10 from the office or Eyerly. 



Qualification for Attendance as a Participant in the Sailing Regatta For MS

Sponsorship

A Boat sponsorship qualifies 2 individuals representing that sponsor to attend as participants. Any sponsorship comprised of more than 1 single person is considered a "syndicate". Any syndicate regardless of the number of members comprising that syndicate, only qualifies as a single sponsorship enabling 2 individuals representing that syndicate to attend as participants.

Donation

A major donor, one who has donated a value of \$200 or more in needed food, beer, materials, etc. for the event, qualifies for attendance of 2 participants.

Boat Participation

Power/Spectator Boats

A sponsored spectator boat qualifies 2-3 crew for attendance. A qualified crew member may bring 1 (one) guest for a \$10 donation.

Sail/Race Boats

A sponsored sail boat qualifies the "normal" number of crew utilized to race that individual vessel (Please be honest!) for attendance. A qualified crew member may bring 1 (one) guest for a \$10 donation. Example: Abracadabra - 6 crew members including skipper, therefore 6 individuals qualify for attendance.

Committee Boat

The committee boat crew qualifies for participation. A qualified crew member may bring 1 (one) guest for a \$10 donation.

Volunteer Work

Recognized volunteers on the official volunteer list qualify for attendance as individuals. This includes all MS Regatta committee chairpersons, etc.*

Other

- MS Board members and 1 (one) guest who are not involved in the Regatta as committee people, etc. qualify to attend for a \$10 donation per person*
- EYC Club Officers and Board members and 1 (one) guest each qualify to attend for a \$10 donation per person.*
- PARENTS, please note: This is an ADULT function, with alcohol being served, and is not an appropriate event for young children.

*Must have prior reservation listed on the registrar's official list to qualify for attendance.

radio controversy. The U.S. Coast Guard, many state watercraft agencies and marine safety groups had asked the FCC not to hike marine radio fees for pleasure boaters.

The agency went ahead and increased the license from \$35 to \$115 last July.

The result, complain marine groups, are boaters unwilling to pay the FCC fee and launching without the safety of a marine radio.


"A radio is a boater's lifeline," McKee said. "We're bitter about the fee increase. The amount of services boaters receive from the FCC for the fees paid are like a firecracker compared to the atomic bomb."

Legislation has been introduced to eliminate the FCC marine radio fee for pleasure boats. Under fire, the FCC reportedly plans to reduce the permit fee to \$75 later this year. Refunds after the decrease, though, haven't been discussed.

In the meantime, the U.S. Coast Guard is actively checking boaters for marine radio licenses and issuing citations.

A boater arriving at Lorain Harbor at 11:30 pm on Monday evening was cited by U.S. Coast Guard officers for failing to have a marine radio license, even though the radio did not have a microphone attached and was not being used to transmit.

"We send the citations to the FCC," said Lt. Fred Milbry of the Coast Guard's Ninth District Station in Cleveland. "We've been told that the FCC will send a letter and an application form to the owner of the vessel, giving first offenders the opportunity to get a license before facing FCC fines."

WOW, is this place hopping . . .



- 4.) No electric or combustion engine power. Sail or manpower/womanpower only.
- Maximum crew size 4 people.
- Lifejackets must be worn by everyone racing.
- Judges have final ruling on eligibility,
- 8.) Each "yacht" must have floating device (bottle, life) jacket) tied to it in case of a sinking so the "wreck" can be located.
- Course to be announced on Race Day. It will be run within the basin area in front of the Club.
- 10.) Sign-up poster will be in the galley after July 4th.
- Prizes awarded for best speed, most creative, and other categories.




The Centennial Ball was an impressive success, and I congratulate all those involved in its planning and flawless execution. Rainbow Gardens never looked so classy!
