### **Junior Sailing Update**

As our sailing program moves towards the twenty-first century, the learn-to-sail philosophy is alive and well. But there is one aspect of the program which needs immediate attention.

The Junior Sailing House on the Flying Junior dock has become a major safety hazard in the last ten years for several reasons:

- 1.) Inadequate storage space for the gasoline tanks, toxic resins and solutions create unbearable noxious fumes due to the poor ventilation;
- 2.) Gasoline now soaks the floor creating an enormous fire hazard;
- 3.) The windows have been frequently kicked in and supplies stolen regardless of the windows being locked;
- 4.) Sails and lines are being replaced twice as fast due to inadequate storage;
- 5.) Wood rot on the foundation of the lower northwest corner threatens to collapse the building.
- 6.) The decrepit door does not symbolize one of the greatest sailing facilities on the Great Lakes and the eastern shore.

As the Reyburn Sailing School approaches a carrying capacity of over 250 students, this facility has reached exhaustion. A new sailing house is needed for a safe working environment for the instructors and students, along with protecting the longevity of our equipment.

The Potter Fund has been set up by the family of Jeff Potter for a memorial of this past instructor and director of the Reyburn Learn To Sail Program. When Jeff directed the program he was especially concerned about the maintenance and upkeep of our boats and equipment. I see no better way to preserve the memory of one of our finest instructors with the dedication of "Potter Junior Sailing House" which will protect our environment and create a safe learning environment for instructors and students. As the Erie Yacht Club celebrates its centennial this year, I am asking the Yacht Club community to keep this in mind - the Potter Fund only covers one quarter of our financial goal. If you would like to make a donation, whether it be money, wood, windows, doors or even nails, it would be greatly appreciated. Our goal is to have the Potter Sailing House ready for the 1995 sailing season. Please help us make this dream become a reality. Thank You!

- Additional equipment necessary: Four 25' dock lines, plenty of fenders, marine radios.
- 3.) Erie Yacht Club cannot be responsible for any damage or injury incurred with this event. Skippers are responsible for their crew following the instruction of the organizers to continue to make this event safe and enjoyable for all. Skippers must attend the skippers' meeting or make other arrangements with the organizers.
- 4.) Please do not go swimming or exit your vessel until given the organizers' okay that it is safe. For the safety and courtesy of all participants, no open fires or barbequing will be allowed during RaftUp.
- 5.) To qualify to be in the raft, participants agree to stay rafted from 8:00 a.m until 3:00 p.m.
- 6.) Due to expenses we must incur in advance, we cannot refund any registration or party money for any reason. If we cannot hold the RaftUp due to weather, we will attempt again the next morning.



Ice finally came, and it's possibly the best it's been in recent memory. The iceboaters have been really taking advantage of it. In fact, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, February 17, 18 and 19 were as close to heaven that an iceboater will

Interesting plans have been made for the Reyburn Sailing School this year. We'll be purchasing two new Club Juniors as well as two more Optimist Dinghies, and are going to construct a new Junior Sailing utility building to replace the obsolete structure we've been using. The house will be dedicated to the memory of Jeff Potter (a Reyburn Sailing School alum), and will be built with all volunteer labor. The lumber for this building is, however, stretching our budget to the limit, and any donations to this fund would be appreciated. Along the same line, we are still in need of another safety boat. The Optimists are a great addition to an already successful program, but we're concerned that we should reduce the student-to-safety boat ratio particularly within the Optimist Fleet because these are the youngest participants. 
