Yacht Club Summers Long Remembered

hesitate to reminisce about the life of the Erie Yacht Club because I'm such a newcomer, having discovered the club as a junior sailor in the late 1950s. After all, this is a club where the sons and daughters of old men and women become old men and women themselves, and still belong. There are plenty of members who go back a lot further than I. Yet I find myself full of nostalgia sometimes for the club that was my second home during my teenage years in the early 1960s.

The old clubhouse was still in use, and the harbor was much smaller, though many old-timers used to recall when the harbor was smaller still. We kids thought it was a joke when trucks started hauling fill and dumping it into the bay far to the east of the club - way on the other side of the creek, which formed a natural boundary at the time. We used to swing across the creek on a rope, and spear moon-eyes at the mouth of the creek in the late winter.

The creek has since been rerouted and the mouth is now all the way over at Fern Cliff. The fill those trucks were dumping into the bay has become the east pier of

As EYC enters its second century, we don't want to lose our past, and we rely on the memories of our members to keep our tradition alive. So share some of your recollections, even if they're only a few paragraphs long.

We're also interested in your observations on current events. The main thing is, The Log has no staff. You, the members, are the staff. Now get to work! a much bigger EYC harbor. The entire focus of the club has shifted to the east a considerable distance.

When my pals and I were growing up, Marty Pomorski was dockmaster, and he didn't have much help. He worked alone during the day, and Harry Edler took over when Marty went home. When Harry became ill – he was quite elderly – Merle

Coon took the job. Rounding out the staff was Otto "Spike"

Hershberger, the graveyard-shift night watch-

man.

A boy came of age when Marty gave him his test on the tender, and a kid's first solo trip in the tender was a thrilling experience. That

was followed, usually a couple years later, by permission to drive the jeep and an old Ford tractor the club had.

A gang of us hung around the Canoe House, and in the summer, we knew a lot of ways to make money. Most kids washed boats, a job that could bring in \$20 or \$30 for a few hours work. If you calculated what \$20 in 1963 would be worth in today's money, it would be a tidy sum – probably \$60.

I was fortunate to have inherited the ice business from John Schuler, though John was ice man during its heyday. By the time

I took over, the ice business was in serious decline. In fact, I was the last full-time ice man (Marty sold ice for awhile after I quit). Not many yachts still had ice boxes, but I managed to sell, as I recall, about 900 pounds a week, which made me a profit of \$90, not counting tips. That was

also not counting ice cubes, which I bought for 25ϕ a bag and sold for 50ϕ . I loved big-boat regattas because the club would pay me to give a bag of cubes to every visiting boat.

With both the ice business and boat washing, there was a lot of sitting around while we waited at the Canoe House for customers. We took up chess to pass the time, and after awhile, some of us became darned good chess players. John Altman was the best of the lot, and he was equally expert at card games, card tricks, and assorted gambling schemes that we all spent weeks trying to master.

Dockmaster

To help keep the club grounds looking ship-shape during the hauling season, we have placed pallets throughout the area. These pallets are there so you may put your blocks and wood shims on them. You no longer have to put these items behind the garage. At the beginning of each hauling season the club will put these pallets out in various areas of the grounds. This will make it a little easier for you to get your blocks in the fall and putting them away in the spring.

On June 21 the 39th Annual InterClub Cruise will be in our port. Be advised that this cruise will bring about 60 boats to our basin. These boats will be put in empty slips and rafted off in front of the clubhouse and at other points throughout the basin. If you happen to have one of those slips that may be

blocked in by rafted boats, please call our Dockmaster Bill Vogel to possibly have your boat moved to another slip for those two days.

LAUNCHING All stickers must be displayed on your boat before it will be launched. If you do not have your sticker, you will be asked to reschedule your launch. We ask that all members please clean up the area where your boat was stored. Please do not leave your empty paint cans, tarps, or blocking lying around. Please police your area after you launch.

If you have not requested or registered your boat for a dry sail sticker, please

notify the office. Members, if you have children who dry sail, please call the office to apply for a sticker.

All dry sail boats must be stored in the dry sail lot located to the east of the Club. Dry sailboats are not to be stored on the keg dinghy ramp. The dinghy ramp is for keg use only. Please contact the Dockmaster with any questions.

Every voyage is a journey into the unknown, and Harry is still out there, waiting for me.



Rowing Races Set for May 18

The 1996 Mercyhurst Prep Invitational Regatta will be held on Saturday, May 18. Racing will be underway from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The starting line is near the northeast corner of the Yacht Club and crews will row west with the finish line off Somerheim Pumping Station. The course is approximately 150 yards wide and there will be a staging area just to the east of the Yacht Club.

We would ask that all boat traffic leaving the Yacht Club during racing hours proceed north and cut across the race course at minimum wake speed before turning east. Boats entering the Yacht Club should stay north of the staging area and race





Like typically mischievious kids, we devised a game where each player threw one shoe. The guy who threw the worst shoe got tossed into the bay, which in those days was a lot dirtier than it is now. Of course, he tried to pull as many kids as he could in with him.

In those days there was no gate or guard shack. People came and went as they pleased, whether members or not. The guard shack was built about 1963. My close chum, Phil Callahan, was the first gate guard. If memory serves me well, today's funky-looking guard shack, which has inspired artists, is basically unchanged since it was erected.

The problem with nostalgia is you start missing all the great people who are no longer with us. I'm glad the club preserved the tradition of firing the cannon at sunset. When I hear the cannon roar, I think of it as being in their honor.






Rear Commodore's Report

The renovated lighthouse deck will also be finished soon. I just purchased six picnic tables and some wooden furniture to go on the deck. It's going to be a great spot!


> The first leg of our docks renovation project was completed,


