

If you guessed "Who is Byron Cooley" — you're correct. This photo of the water-color by Byron Cooley, along with some Byron Cooley original writings were recently donated to the Erie Yacht Club by Dave Sample, and are now safely preserved at the Erie County Historical Society as part of the Erie Yacht Club Collection, for our future referral and use.

The EYC Historical Committee was restarted as an active committee in July, 1994 to be a source for reference materials for the Centennial Book and other Centennial events. The committee discovered, soon after its reactivation, that many important historical documents and pictures of past years had been stored in ways that caused their destruction rather than their preservation. Proper preserving procedures were not known and were not possible. Action was needed to prevent further losses and to secure additional photos, documents and historical data to replace those that were lost. Many members came forward lending and giving the Club items from their personal collections. This Club's history, like all history, is an important link to its future. As the Club changes, it is important to be able to look back. WHAT IS NEW TODAY WILL BE OUR HISTORY TOMORROW.

The Club now has an ACTIVE Historical Committee of 12 members with total cooperation of the Club Staff, Bridge and Board. The Erie Yacht Club collection is now maintained in proper preservation format



at the Erie County Historical Society, and The Erie Yacht Club History, in the form of pictures, invitations, letters, *Logs*, and other materials are SHARED with everyone who comes into the Yacht Club Lobby. Every quarter new "Historical Displays" appear in the special Historical Display Case. We now need you to help us further. SEARCH your attics, basements and hidey holes – bring us your EYC artifacts so they can be shared with all members now and throughout the years. If you can gift items from your collections, great. If not, provide us with copies or lend us the originals to reproduce, and we will return the originals to you. We're greedy – we want as much as we can get.

# Things are Happening





On behalf of your Bridge, Board and Staff, I would like to wish you a safe, healthy and enjoyable New year. Now is the time of the year when many people are browsing the boat catalogs, and the rest are flying around on their iceboats. Hopefully this winter will be better than last for outdoor activities. A cure for cabin fever is lunch at the Club. Mike has put service improvements in place to make certain your business lunch is prompt.

Your Club is in great shape as the

winter starts, the low water is easier on the docks, and we may not need to pull the catwalks like we have done in the past. All our bubblers are ready just in case. The low water has also enabled Bill Vogel and "hands-on" Fleet Captain Jim Lockwood to dive the basin and find some old mooring anchors. The anchors are concrete slabs and will be removed. That should prevent some groundings by our deeper draft sailboats.

Another item of interest in our basin are new dry hydrants. Board Member John Murosky and Bill Hertel of the Erie Fire

Department are teaming up to dramatically improve our fire protection. The hydrants are PVC tubes with strainers permanently placed under docks at several locations. These hydrants will give the Fire Department clear access to all the water they need in the event of a fire. John and Bill Vogel are working with the Fire Department to assure

most effective placement.

The basin is empty and Bill Vogel and crew are hard at work already preparing for spring and the 1999 boating season.

If you have not been down to the Club since fall, you will be amazed at the low water level. Let's hope for precipitation! Just a little over a year ago we were concerned about the high water levels we were experiencing and many docks were under water. Now you can actually see dry areas around the pilings.

By now you will have received your slip applications for 1999. Two items mentioned in

the letter included the need to raise slip fees and insurance certificates for outside contractors.

In regards to certificates of insurance, it was suggested to the Board of Directors and your Bridge Officers that we needed to take measures to protect both the Club and our fellow members. This last year there were some "close calls," both on the grounds and dockside where independent contractors had serious accidents which luckily found no one hurt or any major damage to members' boats. The new policy that is now in effect is nothing new that the Club does not insist when contractors are working, be it in the Clubhouse or on equipment on the Club grounds. Please inform anyone you may hire to work on your boat to report to the office so we will have his or her information on file.

Concerning the increase in slip fees. The dock committee, after quite a bit of discussion and meetings, felt they had no choice but to raise fees after not breaking even for more than two years. As your Club has grown, increases in wages and maintenance items continue to rise. The additional dollars in slip fees will find the docks back in the black. Mike and Bill both do a great job making sure that budget items stay in line. They are both aware that you have to constantly watch costs, be it overtime in the spring trying to get all the boats in, or purchasing supplies for dock maintenance.

The dock committee is hard at work making dock assignments and we hope that we will be able to fulfill your special requests. Please remember that the club has a "best fit" policy for all boats to make the best use of our available slips.

I look forward to some great off-season events down at the Club.

I hope everyone had a safe and enjoyable Holiday Season with your family and friends. Commodore Pete and Amy Gorny had their crew do a beautiful job decorating the Clubhouse while Dockmaster Bill and his crew hung lights on the flagpole and lighthouse.

I would like to express my deep gratitude to Connie Wolford, Doc Bressler and the newest part of our Breakfast with Santa crew, John McGrane. John, or as I like to call him – Santa McGrane, agreed to become our new Santa. I asked John if he would consider becoming our new Santa after hearing from Henry Lorence that he was retiring to Florida early. John put his heart and soul into the part and did a fabulous job. I really feel he had more fun then the kids did. Both Breakfast with Santas were sellouts this year again. After talking with my staff, we have decided to do a Dinner with Santa next year as well as our Breakfasts. With life becoming more and more fast-paced, and weekends at such a premium with families, we thought that Dinner with Santa on a week night would be a nice addition.

I would also like to thank Henry Lorence, who retired this year as the EYC Santa Claus. Henry performed the task of Santa for many years and made countless numbers of children very happy. I know that he enjoyed doing it as much as the kids enjoyed sitting on his lap. Henry, you were missed this year, and I for one appreciate every year that you dressed up and became Santa. Thank you!

Congratulations are in order to Past Commodore G. "Gib" Loesel. Past Commodore Loesel was this year's recipient of the Thompson Memorial Trophy. The trophy is awarded each year at the Annual Meeting to the person who has shown, over the years, "outstanding achievement in the world of yachtsmen and yachting." Congratulations P/C Loesel!

A number of projects will be starting or have started this winter. First, the Board of Directors have approved the funds to continue our dock piling replacement program. This year we have chosen docks L-22 through to L-54. We will be either pulling out the old pilings or burning them off below the water line. The new pilings will be made up of both 7 and 8-inch diameter steel and will be drilled/pounded into the shale. The eight-inch pilings will be used on each dock that has a catwalk. The seven-inch ones will be used between each dock. All new

uprights will also be installed. This will all be performed over the winter and early spring.

Another project that was approved was the paving of the parking lot in front of the Clubhouse. As the plan goes, we will be replacing the paved area under the car port with a concrete pad. The paved areas will include the existing parking lot, an area running east from the lift station along the front of the trailer that sits along the south fence and a patch used as parking for employees. That will free up the spaces currently being used by employees for member use. Once the paving is done we will re-stripe the lot and move all the spaces about four feet north. Our plan is to have the concrete work done during shutdown and the paving done once all the boats are in. Once the boats are in generally means in June. Because of the area that is being done, I can see the potential for some problems, so please bear with us.

Some of the other projects that will be coming up this year will be the purchase of a new trailer for boat hauling and a new truck for

the grounds department. The trailer will permit us to do a better job of winterstoring boats that use jack stands or foam cradles. As well as the mobility to use more of our property as storage areas.

We will be doing a number of smaller improvements in the Clubhouse this year. One of them is finished as I write this. We replaced the four doors in the west entrance with two single doors. We constantly had very bad drafts during the winter and air-conditioning would run constantly in the summer. I hope to have new partitions installed in the Ladies Room during Shutdown. I am also looking at having some low-level lighting installed on the Clubhouse deck. Nothing big and bright, just enough light to see where you're going.

In closing, I would like to remind everyone to watch for flyers advertising upcoming club events. We will have our traditional Super Bowl party on January 31st and a Country Western Dinner Dance on February 6th plus a whole lot more.



# Greetings Fellow Yacht Club Members and Friends

First, I was amazed at how many projects we did during the season last year with almost no disruption with any of the functions, gatherings, and boating. I give a lot of credit to Mike Lynch, Mark, Lori, Billy, and the rest of the crew for doing a fine job of keeping things flowing smoothly.

I believe the best thing we can do for our Club would be to increase the amount of communications between members, bridge, and board, and the management of the EYC. Currently Mike is working on a website with e-mail to help create a better club for us all. This e-mail will have direct links to all the management and bridge and board. We feel this will increase the amount of help Mike needs to try and work with the members in keeping our Club on the top of the list for the quality and value of our membership. Our Club is still the best yacht club within miles of here if not the best around. I believe the perception starts when you drive down the hill towards our club as you seem to pass back in time looking up at the bridge with all the trees and foliage. You can see many squirrels, chipmunks, and birds. The winding road ends up at the guardhouse and you are welcomed usually by John at the gate. The bridge and board feel that it's time to renovate the gate system as many breakdowns, damage, and inconveniences have interrupted the normal flow to the Club and its facilities. We are still in the "deciding stages" as how to best serve the majority of our members, so please feel free to contact me or any other bridge/board member so we may convey your feelings and make a good decision. I believe we have committed \$35,000 to this project, so we should get value for our monies spent here as this is the first thing that you see coming onto our property.

Mike has investigated the entrance area to the lounge on the west side of the club and has decided to renovate the entrance doors. His reasons seem to be good as explained to me. The doors are leaking air that causes waste during the winter and summer in the cost of heating and air-conditioning. We could put new weather stripping in but the doors must first be realigned. Another good reason for this project is by eliminating the eastward swing of these doors it will lessen the chance of wind damage when the doorsare caught in a heavy west wind, which would result in the seals once again needing realigned. Another good reason is the access of the beverage and food deliveries. If you ever watched the delivery people trying to hold two doors open and try to bring cases of beer, pop, and kegs, you can clearly see the need for one larger door. This will minimize the chance for accidents. The light fixture, carpet and handrail will also be updated. The handrail will be re-varnished for appearance reasons. Good work Mike!
