A Date with Destiny

As January 1, 2000 draws nearer, concerns about unforeseen computer glitches are making headlines routinely. Many boat owners are starting to think about their own marine electronics and wondering if they're "Y2K" compatible.

After checking with all of its major suppliers, BOAT/U.S. has found that fears about Y2K problems in marine gear are largely unfounded.

No manufacturer has alerted BOAT/U.S. of any electronic or electrical product currently sold which will quit working

because of the millennium change. In addition, all computer software sold by BOAT/U.S. is Y2K compliant, and tide programs are generally projected to remain accurate through at least 2020. Keep in mind that this assessment is based on reports from manufacturers. BOAT/U.S. has not done any specific product testing.

There may be instances, however, where electronic equipment may generate incorrect dates after 2000, but otherwise continue to function normally. Boaters should also use caution when interfacing different pieces of equipment with other gear, especially tide-and current-predicting software. The manufacturer of these products is the final authority as to a unit's compliance and performance while interfaced with other gear.

GPS Rollover Event

The date and time which might have the most impact upon boaters is not New Year's Day 2000, but August 21, 1999 at midnight GMT. This is the "End of the Week" (EOW)

rollover, the date when the Global Positioning System (GPS) satellites begin a second 20-year set of "weeks" in determining the date and time.

The GPS system was programmed with a calendar of 1,024 weeks, enough for 19.6 years. Week 0 was in January 1980 and the GPS calendar will run out of weeks on midnight this coming

August, 21-22, a Saturday night, but actually

at Greenwich or Zulu time. On that date, the system will roll over to Week 0 again and be good to go for another

20 years. In the eastern United States, it will occur at 8 p.m. EDT.

The rollover of the GPS calendar will only affect the operation of GPS receivers. Older (pre-1994) GPS receivers may require re-initializing, give inaccurate

date or time information, or quit working altogether.

BOAT/U.S. has contacted all the major marine GPS manufacturers and found, with only a couple of exceptions, that units manufactured from 1994 on are both EOW and Y2K compliant. In addition, all products listed in the 1999 BOAT/U.S. equipment catalog are compliant and owners of such equipment should expect no problems during the rollover periods.

Noncompliant GPS units probably will give erroneous information for a period of anywhere from six to 15 minutes, if running at the time the EOW rollover occurs on August 21. They may revert to an "autolocate" function, require re-initialization, or some

very old units may simply quit working and remain in a "search" function. It's recommended that boaters not leave GPS receivers interfaced with other electronics, especially autopilots, during rollover periods. It would also be a good idea to shut your GPS down completely during the EOW Rollover event (August 21, 1999 at midnight GMT), and restart it at least 15 to 20 minutes later.


One exception, however, is Micrologic, whose GPS receivers made before 1996 may not function after August 21, depending upon which software was installed. Micrologic cannot be reached by phone as they are not currently in business in the U.S. but can be contacted via e-mail (see page 1).

(LORAN units rely on land-based radio towers, and calculate time differently. They will be unaffected by the "End of Week" rollover.)

We recommend that electronics users contact the manufacturer for specific compliance questions. In addition, BOAT/U.S. Marine Centers have vendor contact information for the manufacturers of items currently listed in the BOAT/U.S. 1999 Annual Equipment Catalog. BOAT/U.S. will also include any important updates on the Association's website at www.boatus.com.

For specific product updates, nearly all GPS manufacturers have Web sites where they continually update information for both Y2K and EOW rollover. The list below covers most of the major manufacturers. Also, the U.S. Coast Guard's navigation Web site includes a list of manufacturers' names, addresses, phone numbers and customer service contacts. Waste____ DISPOSAL

This is a reminder to dispose of all your waste in the appropriate containers. The recyclable containers are clearly marked and are located throughout the Club. For the benefit of all members and the wellbeing of the Club, don't throw oil, fuel, tires, acid or any other non-desirable items in either the trash or recyclable containers. The Club is held responsible for items thrown into the waste containers and will be fined if these items are found in the containers. Also, the containers are here for the disposal of garbage from the Clubhouse and members' boats. Do not bring your garbage from home down to be disposed of. Members seen throwing garbage from their vehicles and believed to be coming from some source other than their boat, will be billed for that disposal.

Float Plans

All slip holders are required to file a float plan with the Fuel Dock before leaving on an extended cruise. The Club will rent your slip out while you are gone. By not filing a Float Plan you run the risk of finding your slip occupied when you return. The Club checks the basin daily to see which slips are empty, which are then assigned to visiting boaters.
