# 2021 Race Fleet Recap



Fleet chair Fritz Busse skillfully helmed the 52 boat race fleet to a prosperous rebound following a year of countless questions and continuous uncertainty formally navigated by our optimistic 2020 Chair, Aaron Ackerman. The rebounding year of 2021 included a full race schedule and the numerous events as normally organized. Commander Busse had the aid of abundant volunteer committee members to forge the fleet into a successful completion. This effectiveness continued a long history of EYC yacht racing and great events as evidenced by the many trophies and awards in our EYC display case.

True to its name, fleet racing again began in mid-May and continued through September with some 40 races and 9 party/awards dates on the carefully massaged schedule.

New to the events list was a February Winter Social happening held in a large tent equipped with heaters situated on our east basin wall. This cool event included ice skating, iceboat rides, hot chili, hot chocolate, hot coffee & ice cold beer and lots of friendly conversation to get the fleet off to a great 2021 start. After many successful summer events, the season culminated on November 6th with the annual jam-packed awards dinner and dance. Chairman Busse and upcoming 2022 Chairman Chris "Skip" Grychowski held an entertaining laugh filled program all while providing the honors due to the various award winners. Congratulations and thanks to Taylor Hoover who has volunteered as Assistant Fleet Chairman for 2022 and Fleet Chair for 2023.

The evening's presentation included a hilarious musical video parity of the fleet presented by Shawn Phelps and Tom Madura still available for viewing. Yes, there is an app for that, just search for "Yacht Club Log" on the YouTube channel for a repeat performance.

The prestigious Zurn Trophy and Boat of the Year honors were both earned by *Taz III* (Beneteau 40.1) helmed by P/C Peter Lund and crew. The fleet's Family Jib and Main Division which races over the season with a constantly diminishing handicap is divided into four classes relating to their speed potential and experience. The 2021 Class D Champion is *Take Two* (C&C 30) skippered by the Chris Laird/Shane Wohlrabe duo.

The C Class Championship went to Thomas Schuyler IV and crew on Infinity (Tartan 33). The 29' J-boat Joker owner by Albert A.J. Ficcardi took Class B Champion honors with Class A's Attack (J-109) owned and operated by the Jack Gordon & P/C Matt Niemic topping the class. There were many other notable honors presented during the evening including Yacht's Women of the Year presented to a humble Fay Trost. The annual Race Committee's selection for the Gail Garren trophy was rewarded jointly to Tom & Fay Trost.


Yes, 2021 brought the return of races which brought the skippers and crew back to their high tech weather forecasting instruments examining the many weather-wind predicting applications on board, The race fleet membership was on their wrists and on their phones. These wind and weather applications had varying levels of success and one could actually search until finding a weather prediction that was in fact more desirable by the searcher. There is NOAA, Windy, Sail flow, PredictWind and Accu-Weather among others. The Davis Weather app and Nullschool are both available on the EYC website. Also skippers can check-in with that most prominent site, TWC more affectionately known by many as "the sky is falling" channel for their dire predictions.

A number of crewmembers jokingly compare these dubious weather forecasting applications to see which was 1800 from reality. The actual truth on the racecourse is that the racers who guessed the best most likely gave themselves the edge that helped determine the winner.

Smooth sailing...





After a modified (thanks to COVID) format in 2020, The 2021 edition of the EYC Chili Cup race returned in full form, and it once again marked a great end to the EYC racing season. This event began way back in 2009 and has continued to grow in popularity each year to become one of the most anticipated Fall sailing events at the Erie Yacht Club. The camaraderie of a sailboat race and a chili cookoff on a cool October aftercombination to finish off the racing season. Boats, chili, beer, and sailors telling tall stories - it doesn't get much better. October sailing in Erie is always a bit unpredictable, and over the years we have had just about every kind of weather imaginable (with the exception of snow, but who knows what the future may hold?).

There were slightly fewer boats than in past years, due mainly to the early haul-out deadline last Fall to allow for work on the gas dock. However, a total of 17 boats still participated, which I felt was a very good turnout under the circumstances.

The weather forecast for the 2021 Chili Cup was calling for rain and up to 18 knots of wind with gusts up to near 25 knots. Thankfully, noon just seems like the perfect the weatherman was once again were disqualified from the race for way off, at least on the timing. The race started in a moderate breeze and dry skies, although it did drizzle enough to require some rain gear later in the race, and the wind did pick up to 15-plus knots by the end of the race. Typical Fall sailing conditions!

With the return to the normal format, prizes were awarded for both sailing and cooking, and the much-coveted Chili Cup trophy was awarded to the boat with the combined highest score in both racing and chili cooking. The race is run under the "Family JAM" rules, and the large fleet had boats of all sizes, again including several Windmills. Phil Mashyna and Cutter Niemic even sailed their E-Scow "Space Scowboy". They using a spinnaker, but you could hardly blame them - the boat looked great with that chute flying! Pat Huntley's Windmill Graffiti took first place in the race, barely beating out A. J. Ficcardi's J-29 "Joker". Windmill sail #3026 came in third - quite a nice showing by the Windmill fleet. Each boat received a prize ribbon and a bottle of wine for their efforts on the race course.

For the chili cookoff, the Race Committee PRO Mike Squeglia, with help from Tom and Fay Trost and Deac Manross, once again stepped up to taste and judge 18 different chili recipes! After much deliberation, they eventually reached a consensus and awarded first place to the entry from Joker. This was Joker's second consecutive win in the chili cook-off! Second place in the chili cook-off went to Space Scowboy, while third place went to Good Vices. In keeping with the tradition, the prizes for the chili recipes were cooking related - the three winners received bamboo cutting boards. With second place in the boat race and first place in the chili cookoff, Joker repeated as winner of the Chili Cup trophy, having won it previously in 2019. (The overall Chili Cup trophy was not awarded in 2020).

This trophy is a sailboat-shaped wooden cutting board with a brass plaque on the front and the names of each year's winner inscribed on the back. It is on permanent display in the EYC trophy case.

One change to this year's event was that the chili sharing and beer-drinking after-race portion of the day was moved from the West Deck to the Lighthouse deck, which seemed to work out just fine. No circuit breakers were tripped, the chili stayed hot and the beer stayed cold! By the end of the day, everyone seemed to have had their fill of chili, cheese, cornbread, and other treats that racers showed up with.

So, once again, lots of folks came together at the Erie Yacht Club for a great time to sail and socialize. It's what we do best! We hate to rush the seasons, but next October will be here before you know it, so get your chili recipes ready and hopefully we'll see you at the 2022 Chili Cup!





If These Docks Could Talk, they would say: "Byron Cooley was one of a kind, he helped make EYC what it is today!"






"Longpoint Crossing" Penguin Off Long Point.









# Club House Renovation Project APPROVED!

EYC members voted to approve January the club house renovation project at its annual membership meeting held in November. The scope will include all 3 tiers of work, "Must do", "Should do" and "Would like to do," with an estimated project cost of \$8.8 million dollars.

#### What's Next?

Given the desire to start construction in the fall of 2022, immediate action has been taken to start work on the project. During the next 8 months it will seem like not much is happening ... but in reality a tremendous amount of very important work will occur. The Renovation and Finance committees will be working hard to complete many tasks. To give you a sense of the work being done behind the scenes, here is a partial list of milestones to be accomplished:

#### November

 Issue Request for Proposals for Construction Management (CM) & Architectural/Engineering (A/E) services

#### December

- Evaluate CM and AE proposals
- Finalize Contract for CM and AE
- Issue Request for Proposals for Project Loan



- Start Final Design
- Evaluate Loan Proposals

#### **February**

- Complete Schematic Designs
- Negotiation with Lenders

#### March

- Start Construction Documents
- Finalize project phase schedule and Construction Budget
- Finalize Loan Agreement

#### April / May

- Complete Phase 1 Construction Documents
- First Sub contract issued.

#### October

Phase 1 Construction starts

#### How can I help?

Not only are they dedicated but they muster new energy year after year. This year's recipient, Fay Trost, is that kind of individual.

Fay needs no introduction because around the EYC Racing fleet she is ever present and always available to help. This year's Yachtswoman has performed many positions on the boat Keva and other boats over the years: Foredeck, main sail trimmer, jib trimmer, helmswoman, tactician, crew trainer, mixologist, snackologist, nurse, cook and crew organizer!
