ANNUAL REGATTA REPORT

80 boats, representing 7 one-design classes, were on hand for our Eighth Annual Regatta, held on June 7th and 8th. The classes racing were as follows: Star (11 boats), Thistle (23), Rhodes Bantam (15), Fireball (2), Lightning (5), OK Dinghy (7), and Sunfish (17). There was a fine turnout of Sunfish, especially notable since EYC has no active Sunfish fleet.

Although in past years we have been favored with lots of sun, our luck ran out this time. A thick fog took over shortly after the first class had started Saturday morning, and boats without compasses (and some with them, too) groped around searching for the marks. Our Race Committee set a fine course, enabling those who made use of their compasses to find their way around without great difficulty. Two Erie boats took first place in their classes in this race: Dean Klahr in the Star Class, and Mark Rickloff in Rhodes Bantams.

The sun came out and the wind remained light in the afternoon race, blowing from the Northwest as it had in the morning. In this race, Kevin McEnery topped the Rhodes Bantam fleet, Chad Klahr was first in Fireballs, and Doug Russell was first in the OK Dinghy.

The third race, held on Sunday morning, began in light air and soon turned into one of those "drifters", so frustrating to race in. Light, but constant, rain added to the "fun". The Race Committee shortened the course—to everyone's relief, I'm sure.

Kevin McEnery continued his winning ways, finishing first in the third race and first overall in Rhodes Bantams. Peter Lund was second and Mark Rickloff third. In the Star Class, Dean Klahr was top Erie boat, finishing fourth overall. Jack Bierley was sixth in the Thistle Class, and a former EYC member, Barrie Smith, now of Chicago, finished fifth overall. In the Fireball Class, Chad Klahr was first in the third race and overall winner. The Kuebler girls also finished first in the third race, in the Lightning. With second place finishes in the other races, they finished second overall.

In the OK Dinghy Class, Mark Gardner, formerly of Erie, was 2-2-1 for the series to finish first overall. Doug Russell was second. Steve Dunbar, of Chautauqua Lake YC, was first overall in the Sunfish Class.

The Regatta Committee decided to reactivate the Carling Trophy for the most outstanding performance in the regatta. It had not been awarded for three years. The judges' choice this year was Ed Fracker, of Cleveland Yacht Club, sailing a Thistle. Although he did not get to Erie in time for the first race, his two decisive "firsts" in the balance of the series won him the judges' votes. Fracker finished eighth overall with DNS-1-1.

All those who took part in the regatta are most grateful to Al Rickloff and all those who aided him in planning and running the regatta, and to Gail Garren and those who served under him on the Race Committee. Their work is difficult, as racing sailors tend to be a fussy and contentious lot, and when the weather so stubbornly refuses to co-operate, it only adds to the difficulty. To all, a sincere "THANKS" for a fine job.

In conclusion, the writer is going to indulge in some editorializing, for what it's worth. Although an 80-boat regatta may sound like a big event, when those 80 boats are split up into 7 different classes, the figures are not so impressive. It would be far healthier to have that many boats racing in only three or four classes. This turnout for the regatta is indicative also of the turnout for our regular club races. Of course, different people always will have diverse tastes, and I'm not saying that this is bad. But, while difference of opinion is, they say, what makes horse races, it may tend to be harmful to boat races. May I suggest that anyone planning to buy and race a small boat consider one of the more popular classes at EYC, and that those now racing make an effort to stimulate the growth of their classes. It's not really much fun to match-race the same one or two other boats all summer long, and there's no real gauge of achievement in such a situation. Having a few classes in which many sailors are active would be far healthier for the Yacht Club, the classes and the sailors themselves than having several classes with a few boats active in each. There's an excellent article in the June issue of One-Deisgn and Offshore Yachtsman concerning one yacht'club's attempt to solve this common problem. It is a problem which merits consideration by all those who are concerned with the growth of small boat racing at EYC. An Erie Annual Regatta drawing 100 boats in 3 or 4 classes would be an event of real significance to the competitive sailors within "trailing distance" of Erie, and top quality competition would stimulate local sailors' interest in upgrading their own levels of skill. Erie Yacht Club has the setting and the facilities for turning out nationally competitive sailors. All that is lacking is the will to concentrate and to improve one's ability. Only when this is present on the local level, can we expect to see those prestigious National Championship trophies coming home to roost in Erie.
