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



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EXPERIENCING THE ENERGY, PASSION AND EXCITEMENT OF A ROARING 20'S ERA FLIGHT





This beautifully restored Ford Tri-Motor (Serial Number 8) was state of the art stylish aviation nearly 100 years ago.

The first experience was purely auditory as we heard the unique sound of the three low revving engines of the plane flying barely overhead above the small resort island. Then... there she was, the shiny silver aircraft appearing just over the tree tops and floating to a controlled gentle landing on the small air strip at the water's edge near Put in Bay, South Bass Island, Ohio. A group of EYC sailors were visiting the island during participation in the annual Inter-Lake Yachting Association Regatta.

These aerial sights and sounds piqued ones interest to discover more information on who, what and where. After heading to the airport terminal building, we found a small group of soon-to-be passengers outside receiving preflight instructions and interesting historical background information under a canvas canopy providing shelter from the hot sun. Shortly thereafter, having paid the nominal \$75 boarding fee and signing the obligatory legal waiver of liability, we found ourselves seated under the same canvas being briefed on the history and background of the plane.

The 1926 aircraft was the brainchild Henry Ford, the American captain of industry and business magnate and the founder of the Ford Motor Company when he recognized the potential for mass air transportation beyond his contributions in the auto industry.

Mr. Ford thoughts were that due to barnstorming and other dangerous early flying experiences, the public needed to be reassured that flight was a safe and dependable method of travel. The Tri-Motor was built by the Stout Metal Aircraft Division of the Ford Motor Company and was designed to be extra safe being over built in construction and scheme providing unsurpassed safety and reliability. Much of this effort was prominently displayed with the installation of three engines rather than one and publically promoting the fact that the plane will actually fly with only one of these power plants functioning. Each of the nine cylinders in the radial engine produces 50 horsepower providing a total thrust of 450 hp. per engine.

Ford's air machine was the first all-metal commercial airliner in the

The 1926 aircraft was the brainchild world designed for passengers ratherny Ford, the American captain of industry and business magnate and the founder of the Ford Motor world designed for passengers rather than just mail which incidentally led to the construction of the first paved runways.

The Tri-Motor has brought a unique history as it offered passengers a flying experience like never existed before providing an upscale, expensive luxurious flight which fetched passengers dressing up in coats, ties, hats and even gloves for ladies, all typical of this prosperous 1920s era. There were only 199 of these aluminum airframes built in the years between 1926 and 1933.

Our plane, serial No. 8 with tail number NC 9645 is one of only two Ford's still flying today. Constructed in 1928, No. 8 flew its first flight on December 1, 1928. It was sold to Transcontinental Air Transport in January 1929 which eventually became TWA Airlines. The TAT logo appears on the aircraft's fuselage today. Subsequently No. 8 passed through a number of owners and configurations however since then the Liberty Aviation Museum in Port

Clinton acquired it and has currently leased it to the EAA (Experimental Aircraft Association) to promote the Ford around the country as a flying museum and to help raise funds for the Tri-Motor Heritage Museum of Port Clinton which is currently restoring a second plane, serial No. 13 by its volunteer members.

Since the early days of aviation, the Tri-Motor has played a significant part in our Nation's history and for many years 'Island Airlines' served Erie island area residents famously in the use of the Ford Tri-Motor for the vital role of transporting people

the islands and outlying areas. For many years the 'Tin Goose' as it was affectionately known, was a familiar sight gracing the island skies providing reliable, safe shuttling islanders, workers and young students back and forth to the mainland in good weather and bad.

Our plane is over ninety years old but still looked brand new with the highly polished corrugated alumia-lifetime opportunity to experience flight in the world's first mass-produced airliner began as we entered the craft walking up the steep narrow interior to take one of the 15 single leather seats next to the huge windows providing excellent sight out both sides of plane. The interior was adorned with inlayed wooden panels, curtains and fancy lighting wondering who and what station in life they might have had who shared the Tri-Motor experience nearly a century ago.

During our pre-flight briefing, we were informed that Charles Lindbergh, the famous aviator had actually flown No. 8, this very plane.

Shortly after boarding, the pilot in position behind the port steering wheel, seemingly borrowed from one of Ford's cars and labeled 'Ford' was clearly visible to the passengers. The pilot started the engines and was assisted by a flight controller stationed in front of the aircraft.

The controller signaled the start of each engine as he circled the plane pointing at each engine and then twirled his index finger high in the air. After the high pitched whine of the starter, each engine came to life with an abundance of smoke and irregular roar as each of the nine air cooled, exposed cylinder began to fire. Exciting!


The pilot, with all three engines num exterior. Our exciting once-in-rumbling, taxied out to the runway and gently eased the three power plants to full throttle, the plane accelerated and very quickly but smoothly lifted above the runway and immediately leveled off from its pre-flight inclined stance. I was seated next to the starboard engine where I could clearly see the gages located above the engine on its mount. Once obtaining an altitude which brought our imagination alive of about 1500' the pilot throttled back the engines to about 1200 rpm allowing for a wonderful flight. This altitude and low speed allowed for a beautiful view of the island waters, boats and structures below. The 15 minute flight brought ear to ear smiles to all onboard despite ending much too soon.






Last season's final Thursday Night Trivia session proved to be just as much fun as the first with the laughter coming from all corners of the full room.



# If These Docks Could Talk by P/C Gib Loesel The Enigma Model

The other day as I was gazing around the bar (a/k/a) the lounge and admiring some of the various items we proudly display as decorations when I spied the "dear Old Enigma" sitting over in the corner looking as beautiful as ever. Of course, this got me to thinking "again", about how it found its home here? I fully understand that many of our new members and probably most of our guests may never even heard of this "fabled" yacht and what it meant to so many of us as what could rightfully be called EYC's "old time sailors" and their families.

To those of you who don't know anything about the Enigma let me see if I can get you up to speed in 150 words or less: The Enigma was built for Kennedy M. Eckerd commonly referred to as "Uncle Ken", she was designed as a yawl by Chester A. Nedwidek built by Herman Lund (Erie, PA) and launched on May 29, 1931.

She was originally 45 feet overall and later lengthened out to 54 feet, beam 13'6". From the time she was launched until the time she departed Erie she was cruised and raced by the "boys" of the EYC under several "Captains" and became the Queen of Lake Erie Racing, holding most race course speed records. She was Uncle Ken's delight in which he took much delight sharing his wonderful beautiful vessel.

After the boat became Canadian in 1977 (she was sold to Dave Knowles in Port Dover) and Ken had "slipped his anchor" his sister Sue Britton decided to have a model made to honor her brother and his legacy in the world of yachting. As fate would have it one of the premier model builders in the country lived right here in Erie and is the son of P/C Lawrence Nagle. He is also named Lawrence but more commonly known as "Skip". Skip accepted the commission and the project came to life!!

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Getting started is no easy task (keeping in mind that he didn't have a boat to look at). Fortunately he had sailed on her a number of times and his Dad's boat the Eleanor III had been in the slip right next to the Enigma. The first trick was to find the plans, next pictures which would reveal some of the unique details of her deck plan and the running rigging. For example: in the cockpit there is a box on the starboard side that contained a propane bottle (obviously added after 1931), this box was originally built with a slanted side which made it comfortable to lean against.

The box in the model now contains a list of every person who was ever a part of the crew. The trick was to get well over 90 names into the box, this was accomplished by running the original list through a reducing copier several times (not many of those were around in 1975).

This reducing trick also worked on the owner's pennant flown from Mizzen Mast and the EYC burgee flown from the Main Mast. By the way if you take a real close look at the owner's pennant it is a question mark as in "Enigma", but also resembles the south end of a cat facing north. The designer is unknown but the suspect is former Skipper Chuck Schuable.

Throughout the building process Skip would call on those of us who had been a part of the crew for "technical assistance" (in his words) asking questions and having us exam his progress for accuracy. Another example of attention to detail can be found if you examine the skylight on the cabin top, there are seven bars to protect the glass. Skip had the skylight finished with just three bars when Bill Beyer made the observation that there was seven.

When challenged Bill replied that was where we rested our beer cans and if there was only three, the cans would have fallen through. (case closed). If you like attention to detail exam the model closely, the plating of the stanchions, pulpit and other metal parts (not painted) and hand carved eagle under the bowsprit. It was little things like this, that brought the model to life.

Sue gifted the Enigma Model to EYC on August 3, 1995 and asked me to help in organizing the "party" and what a party it was!! I was instructed to invite every person who had served on the crew or had any involvement with the boat.

There was enough food to feed the Navy and enough "kickapoo joy juice" to float not only the model but maybe for the actual boat. There were no long drawn out speeches only good old "sea stories" about the so many great times everyone cherished about and on board this wonderful boat named Enigma and her proud owner Uncle Ken Eckerd!!

If "These Docks Could Talk" they would say; Thanks Uncle Ken, Thanks Sue and Thanks Skip for this everlasting treasure!!
















#### REAR COMMODORE VINCENT CIFELLI

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
Hello fellow members,






### CARRIE KNOX
