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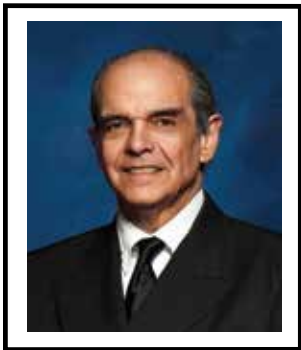
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From the Bridge

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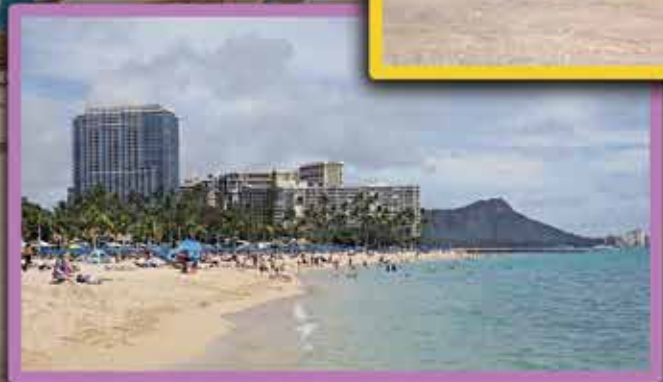

LAND OF Aloha!

If you're looking for a tropical getaway from an Erie winter, you should definitely add the Hawaiian Islands to your list!

Having never been there before, Cindy and I visited for two weeks last April, starting on Oahu for three days followed by a seven-day cruise to three of the other major islands - Maui, Kauai, and Hawaii (The Big Island), and ending up with 5 more days in Oahu. This itinerary enabled us to at least get a sample of what each of the different islands has to offer.

Our trip began with an uneventful, but long (nearly 18 hours) travel day, arriving late afternoon Honolulu time as there is a six-hour time difference from Eastern time. The hotel we chose was the Hilton Hawaiian Village Waikiki, which is a large complex situated in the heart of bustling Honolulu on the famous Waikiki Beach with a great view of the iconic Diamond Head peak.

After spending a day exploring the immediate area around Waikiki, and enjoying the beach, we spent the next day on the far side of the island at the Polynesian Cultural Center, a sort of combination open-air museum and theme park, consisting of 5 separate "villages" showcasing the various cultures of the South Pacific - Hawaii, New Zealand, Tonga, Tahiti, and Samoa. Each "village" offers entertainment and demonstrations of the local way of life. The day ended with a dance show and an authentic luau - something every visitor to Hawaii should experience!

The next day, we departed Oahu on the NCL Cruise ship Pride of America, the only US-registered cruise ship in the world. This allows the ship to remain exclusively in American waters, allowing them to stay within the Hawaiian Islands.

Our first stop was for 2 days at the island of Maui. For our first day there, we had booked an excursion to watch the sunset from the top of Haleakala, an active 10,000-foot volcano.

Unfortunately, it rained most of the day and when we arrived at the summit of Haleakala it was completely enveloped in clouds, accompanied by rain driven by 30 mph winds! Oh - it was also 38 degrees at the summit - not exactly tropical! We had flown 5,000 miles for this? Oh well - as a sailor from Erie I know we can't control the weather!

Our second day on Maui was better - we rode in a van along the famous "Road to Hana" - a twisting, narrow 64-mile stretch of highway that hugs the edge of mountains and crosses many one-lane bridges.

The ride offered a chance to take in some spectacular scenery including dense jungle and picturesque waterfalls as well as stops at several beautiful beaches, where we observed sea turtles basking on the sand and surfers riding the waves.

Our next port of call was Hilo, on the island of Hawaii (known as The Big Island). Hilo served as our starting point for a trip to Volcanoes National Park, site of Mount Kilauea, one of the most active volcanoes on Earth. Unfortunately, (or fortunately, depending on your point of view) Kilauea was not actively erupting during our visit - no fresh lava was visible in the crater, although the sight of the crater with steam and smoke rising from it was still very impressive. Definitely worth the visit!

Our second day on the Big Island we learned much about the history of Hawaii. We began in the city of Kona, as we took another van ride to the area of Kohala, birthplace of King Kamehameha I, the first King of the unified Hawaiian Islands. We visited the site of the Puʻukohola Heiau, an ancient Hawaiian temple built by Kamehameha I, and we also saw the original statue of the king - cast in 1880 and installed in 1883. It stands in front of the old country courthouse in the town of Kapaʻau.

Along the way we passed many old lava fields from earlier volcanic eruptions, and amazing views of the large volcanic mountains that make up the Big Island - particularly Mauna Loa and Mauna Kea. The summits of these two mountains are above 13,000 feet, and they dominate the view from most of the island.

Next up on our busy itinerary was 2 days on the island of Kauai, which we found to be the most laid-back and undeveloped of the four islands we visited. Our first day there was spent on a tour of the scenic spots on the island - beaches, waterfalls, and mountains, as well as a visit to the stunning Waimea Canyon, known as the Grand Canyon of the Pacific. The day was capped off by excellent food and a show at another luau. We were definitely enjoying this island life!

The second day in Kauai was also the last day of our cruise, and we spent a good portion of it cruising along the Na Pali Coast, which is located on the North-west side of Kauai. It is nearly inaccessible, except by boat or helicopter.

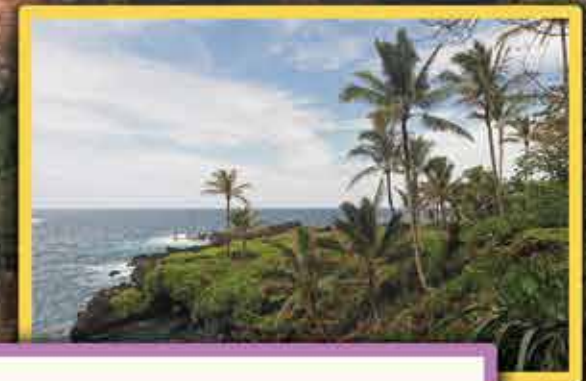
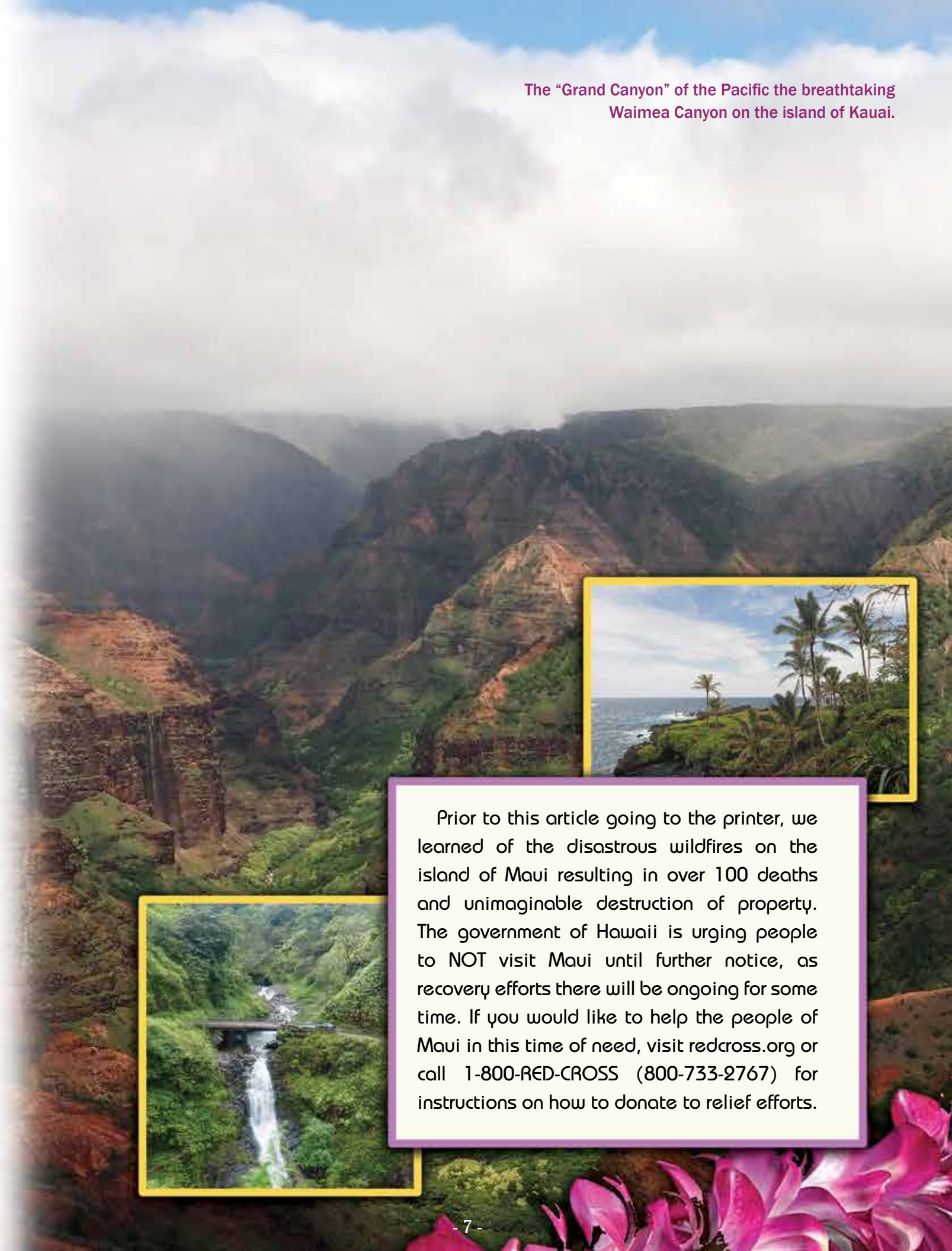
Often regarded as the most beautiful portion of Hawaii, this 17-mile stretch of coastline is considered a must-see for residents and visitors alike. It is a true wilderness area, with sea cliffs thousands of feet high. Viewing this rugged landscape was truly awe-inspiring, and was made even better by a sighting of several humpback whales surfacing near our ship! A great ending to our cruise!

Returning to Honolulu, we spent the last days of our Hawaiian adventure visiting with a relative of mine who lives there, and exploring the local restaurants, bars, and beaches, and sometimes just sitting on our hotel balcony gazing at one of the frequent rainbows seen over the mountains. We even managed to squeeze in a sunset catamaran sail, during which we were lucky enough to see 3 more whales!

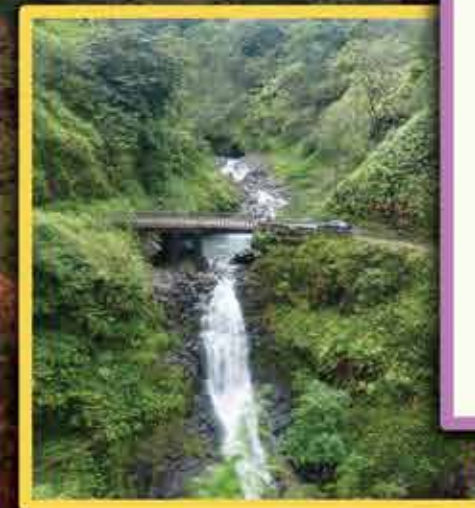
All in all, we found Hawaii to be a beautiful place filled with friendly people, and we learned that "Aloha" is more than a word of greeting or farewell or a salutation. Aloha is a spirit that pervades Hawaiian culture - it conveys mutual regard and affection and extends warmth in caring with no obligation in return, and we could all use a little of that!

CLUBHOUSE RENOVATION PHASE 2 The Fun Stuff is Next!

Phase I of the Renovation Project is almost complete. We finally have a new kitchen that is sized to handle our Club. And a new Entryway, Ballroom and Bliss Room with beautiful woodwork and modern fixtures. And expanded office space for employees. And new bathrooms with showers in the Northeast corner of the building, which will include a Family Rest Room.

It all looks great, but what you don't see is behind the walls and new ceilings. That's where we have all new plumbing, HVAC, ductwork and miles of electrical wire and electrical panels. Plus a fire-suppression Sprinkler System that we never had before, which is much safer for our Members.

Now we are setting our sights on the next Phase, which is on the west side of the building. Thanks in large measure to the Members' approval of an additional assessment, the Board approved moving forward with Phase II on August 21st.

This Phase is more exciting because the Grill Room and Sunset Patio are where we Members spend most of our time in the Club, after all.

LOWER GRILL ROOM

The Upper Grill Room will be expanded to the west of the bar. It will be surrounded by a lower level like we previously had on the north of the Grill Room, going along the west side and then the north side of the Grill Room/Bar area.



UPPER GRILL ROOM

This tiered approach with lots of glass will allow us to enjoy the views on three levels: from the bar stools, from the Upper Grill Room tables, and from the Lower Grill Room tables. We plan on updating the bar top, and new furniture will be added throughout.

Another new feature in the Grill Room will be the "Fireplace Lounge." This is an area in front of the fireplace that will have soft, lower seating as seen in the illustration. It will be a comfy place to hang out, and will allow the fireplace to be seen rather than be hidden behind tables.

SUNSET PATIO

Here is some fun news. When members voted against the 2nd floor "Crow's Nest," the Design Team realized the exit stairs on the north of the building would not be needed. They came up with the brilliant idea of relocating the roof that was planned for the Bliss Patio to the west, and attaching it to the Sunset Patio. The Sunset Patio will now wrap around the Lower Grill Room, and face both North and West.

It was then sent to the Board, who held a special meeting to walk the grounds, and agreed unanimously that Members would like this option much better than having an isolated covered deck off to the East.

QUARTER DECK

This is the new entry on the west side of the building, which will still be the secondary entry. It will be a sunny spot with lots of glass to the west, and a lift for handicapped use.

CONFERENCE ROOM

There will be a large meeting room next to the Rest Rooms that will seat about 14 people. Perfect for a private meal for a group, for the numerous committee meetings held at the club, or as a changing room for a bridal party.

REST ROOMS

NEXT STEPS

The first project is the removal of the current deck, followed by the installation of caissons for the foundation, and then building the structure of the addition.

They hope to have it under roof by December so construction can continue in the cold weather. The Club will close for a week in early October to put together a temporary bar and move into the Ballroom, where we will be dining until Spring. And that is when we can truly enjoy our entirely new clubhouse!

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If These Docks Could Talk

The EYC Mast Hoist

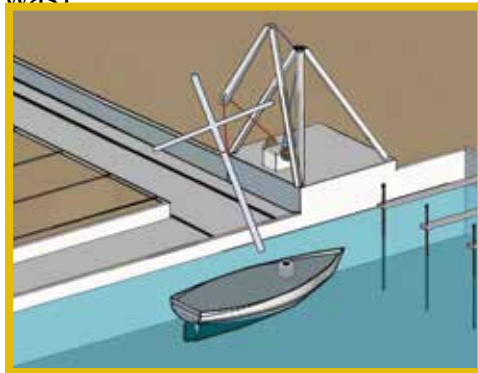


Winch on Right controls the Lifting Boom.

Over the years I have been involved with the Mast Hoist which is located on "I" dock near the fuel dock. This would include "putting in" and "taking out" the spar from my own boat "MeOwnQE", my brother boat one or two of the Nagle boats and countless others just helping out. For some reason it never passed through my "pea" brain as to how the hoist came to be. While researching the recent "Dreamer" story Captain Bierig reminded me that many long years ago "some" things just happened without a lot of formality. When, he told me the following story of course that got me to "thinking" again, more unknown history, another story!!

Dave told it this way, "it was about 1966 when Dock Master Martin Pomorski, Ted Paasch and I were taking the spar out of Jack Amthor's "Windswept", we had the boat tied in by the old "stiff leg" crane near the Canoe House. (Illustration below shows how awkward the set up was)



Everything was set with block and tackle in place, we tugged, we pulled we were cussing under our breath but to no avail. Finally, we resorted to tying off the hauling line and jumping up and down on Windswept's forward deck until the spar broke loose from the step. After that Ted spoke up saying we need to do something different around here this method is not good!!"

Wait, my bet is most of you have no idea who Ted Paasch was; let's start with this, if he were alive today, he would be approximately 121 years old. He graduated from Erie Central High School in 1923 where he was known as a bright but private classmate.

To the best of my knowledge Ted spent his life working on various types of boats, during the second World War he assisted his brother Harold at Paasch Marine Works working on vessels for the war. Ted was also a designer and builder of wooden sailboats several of which are still being sailed out of our Club today. They are Joe Nagle's "Ponemah", Alex Nagle's "Aliana" and Dave Forsman's "Gora". Additionally, Dave Bierig is the proud owner of Ted's personal boat "Anemone".



If you look closely you can see how the old city light posts were used in the construction.

All of these boats were designed by L. Frances Herreshoff one of the premier wooden boat designers in the world. In addition to the above he also built a fleet of Blue Jays for the Reyburn Sailing School and the 18 Footers sailed as a class boat in EYC small boat racing fleet 1940 - 1950, a club member owned each. Ted must have been really private, I tried really hard to find a picture of him but did not have any success.



Dave Bierig produced the picture above of Ted talking with John Kodell, (My guess would be they were talking about the wood sailboat John had recently built himself). When you would see Ted around the "grounds" he was always wearing his Fedora type hat, wire rim glasses and overhauls with wide shoulder straps.

Okay, so what happened? Without any approval, board approval or money Ted "acquired" several old lamp poles from the city scrap pile (at least that is the story) (see picture) and designed the hoist we are using today. With the help of Dockmaster Pomorski and his assistant Miller (no last name, just Miller) they put the units together and placed them on the foundation they created. A single power deck winch was added, quite easy to turn there by allowing the heaviest of mast to be hoisted with out much effort, lots of turns but all for the safety of the user.

For the smaller lighter masts, they installed a 3-part block and tackle. By reviewing the pictures nearby, you can see it is quite simple and ingenious!

I guess you could call this a 4 "NO" project, "NO" committee, "NO" board approval, "NO" money and finally "NO" problems.

If these docks could talk, they would say: Ted, thanks for sharing your brilliance and ingenuity! It is appreciated by those of us who perform this daunting task!!

These are just some of the activities funded this year by the Erie Yacht Club Foundation and its donors. More than \$43,000 was awarded to local nonprofits through our grant process.

Through the Boathouse Party and our various fundraising activities, the Foundation is on track to raise in excess of \$100,000 this year. This will enable us to increase the amount we can distribute in grants in 2024 as well as increase the funds in the endowment.

The Boathouse Party, our major annual fundraiser, was a tremendous success. The weather, music and food were all exceptional. Thanks to Thomas, Elizabeth, and staff for doing such a wonderful job.

Many thanks to our Skipper, Captain, and Admiral Sponsors, and especially our Host Sponsors, John V Schultz Furniture and the Schultz family, and SEPCO Corp. and the Gloeckler family.

On September 16th and 17th, the 5th annual Battle of Lake Erie will be held. It is a regional qualifying regatta for intercollegiate sailing's championship co-hosted by Gannon and Penn State Behrend and supported by the Foundation. As in the past, participants will include about nine universities from across Pennsylvania and NY. Views of the racing and dockside activity are great from the Rickloff Boathouse.
