Architecture of Command Ceremony and reception held on August 30th, 2012 in Cleveland's inner harbor. The ceremony was centered on direct descendent Oliver Hazard, Perry Cabot, who made the transfer of the "Don't Give Up the Ship" burgee struck from the high rigging of the 1813 Flagship Niagara replica to the modern Oliver Hazard Perry class frigate, the USS De Wert.

You might remember that during the Battle of Lake Erie, Commodore Perry made the daring and likely desperate transfer of command from the devastated Lawrence to the undamaged Niagara during the height of this deadly 1813 naval battle accompanied with the famous "Don't Give Up the Ship" battle flag. Niagara was relatively undamaged because she positioned herself to the rear and

out of range of the British Flagship Detroit's long guns. Once in command of the Niagara, Perry boldly sailed forward and engaged the remaining British squadron including the Detroit to triumph in this famous naval battle. The victory secured control of Lake Erie by the United States of America and helped turn the tide in the War of 1812.

Cabot, of Jeffersonton, Va. perched aboard the ship's cutter was lowered into the calm blue water and was rowed from the Niagara across Cleveland's inner harbor to the awaiting officers and crew on main deck of the USS DeWert. This short voyage happened during a mock hail of fire from the Niagara's cannonades with similar return fire from shore side. Two pounds of black powder with no shot was stuffed into the replica guns resulting in a great reenactment of the original scene

with the authentic thundering blast and large volume of smoke encompassing the Niagara giving all an actual sense of the historic moment. Cabot was piped aboard and presented the flag to Commanding Officer, Joseph C. Thomas who accepted and promptly ordered it hoisted above his ship. The symbolic transfer of command to the modern US Navy had now been completed after 200 years.

Cabot was dressed in a period uniform of cap, jacket and tails with a double row of buttons, officer's sword and tall black sea boots and whose physical appearance resembles his famous great grandfather. Graciously attending and fulfilling the character, O. H. Perry Cabot in reality was an intelligence officer who retired as a lieutenant colonel after 28 years in the US Army.

Just in case you were wondering, the USS DeWert is a 453' guided missile frigate commissioned in November 1983. She is equipped with a 3 inch gun capable of shooting 80 rounds per minute, a Phalanx rapid-fire 20mm radar guided six barreled gun able to fire more than 3,000 harder than steel, uranium rounds per minute plus a pair of Sikorsky SH-60 Seahawk helicopters and two triple tube anti-submarine torpedoes launchers.

The two-masted, square-rigged wooden sailing brig Niagara was launched July 4th 1813. She was 198' at her spar length with a crew of 155 officers and sailors armed with 18 carronades and 2 long guns. She was constructed here by Erie citizen, Captain Daniel Dobbins. Dobbins had traveled to the Capital in Washington to persuade the Navy of the need for an American naval force on Lake Erie and of the suitability of Erie as the place to build and base the squadron.

The current vessel, also hailing from Erie, was built by Melborne Smith and launched in 1988 as the third reconstruction of the Niagara. Both the original ship and the sailing replica were built just a short sail down the bay front from the Erie Yacht Club.

The Niagara was under the command of tall ships Captain Wesley Heerssen with a working crew of about 25 for this event plus help from a group of sailors also on board from the U.S. Navy, U.S. Coast Guard and the Royal Canadian Navy. These active duty sailors were present as crew of their respective ships representing their governments for the Navy Week celebration also on Cleveland's waterfront.

The Navy Week event helped highlight the distinct differences between the equipment used in the naval war 200 years ago and current times. Absent two centuries ago was air

support. This celebration between peaceful borders on Lake Erie included an exciting performance by the Navy's Blue Angel flight team who soared and roared high above the modern ships and the historic rigging of the brig in their beautiful powerful F/A-18 Hornets

The appearance of the Niagara was underwritten by the Perry Group, organizer of the 2013 bicentennial celebration of Perry's victory. The Perry 200 Commemoration locally unites us as citizens of Erie, Pennsylvania, United States of America. Future bi-centennial plans include a four day Tall Ships Festival September 5th – 8th 2013 on our waterfront at the Erie County Convention Center.

Customize a Life Ring


A life preserver is not only an important safety item to have onboard, it can also be personalized to be a decorative addition to a boat, or home if the person you are gifting it to has nautical decor. For example the Taylor Made Lettering kit includes 2" black letters and numbers (4 ea.) plus symbols. Each is constructed from waterproof marine-grade 4 mil. vinyl, resistant to fuel, chemicals, fading and scratching. The kit also includes an application template to make it easier for the "do-it-yourself impaired" among us.



Boarding Handle

A great practical gift is a boarding handle. OK so you don't think your boat owner friend or relative needs one, but for many, particularly elderly guests, children, and those new to boating, this makes it a lot safer getting on and off a boat.

An example is this Windline Boarding Handle. It slides into any standard fishing rod holder for a secure grab that is easily removable. It's also useful to feed hoses or shore power cables through to keep them from getting pinched between boat and dock. It's constructed of clear anodized aluminum and breaks down into two pieces for compact stowage.

it dry and clean. They come in a variety of sizes and you simply place your favorite "gadget" in, vacuum out the air with the included hand pump, and the case seals in its contents for complete protection even when submerged underwater. The

case shown features a stereo headphone/ mic jack, and comes with neoprene activity arm band for use with water sports.

Fish Cleaning Station

For your fisherman, this Magma Small Tournament Series Fish Cleaning Station has a stainless steel base which fits right into the rod holder and tilts for easy drainage of fishy mess and for cleaning Includes a place to put your knife and pliers and even has a ruler molded right in so your boat owner can measure his fish. It's UV-stabilized and designed to not rot away in direct sunlight and it won't hold fish odor either which is a large relief. Plus it stores flat!

agree that summers in Erie are glorious. Like many of you, I find every day out on a boat a gift. However, human nature being what it is, we always want more. If you are a fisherman out trolling you are probably thinking, planning, or dreaming of your next outing. If your vice is motoring around our beautiful Presque Isle Bay, then you are looking ahead to the next great adventure exploring the shoreline. If it is the tranquility of sailing using Mother Nature's breeze to power up your sails, you are probably contemplating the next spectacular sunset sail. All of these experiences have their own zen-like qualities that nourish the body and the soul.

Then there is that psychiatric condition called sailboat racing. For those not familiar with medicine or the multitude of different mental disorders there is a psychiatric manual called the DSM IV (Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders) which categorizes and defines all psychiatric illness. ber. Bill Lasher had perfected our rig tuning and we had a set of crisp, barely used regatta sails including a new spinnaker.




P/C DAVID AMATANGELO


