A bright red flag, with a giant C and star, greeted us as we arrived in Turkey, the port of Bodrum, the next day. All passengers required a mandatory Turkish Visa, for which the ship made the necessary arrangements, and charged the fee to each onboard account. We received a list of countries and the fees required: 9 were waived, 12 were charged \$20 to visit the house of the Virgin Mary, authenti-(including USA), and only Canadians were charged \$60! What? Aren't we nice people? Did we ever do anything to Turkey? To top if off, no one ever looked at the Visa! Anyway, we took a very interesting tour of the waterfront, and photographed their famous "Gullet" wooden sailing craft, beautifully made only



In the meantime, there was a homemade



During the beautiful afternoon, the individual boats headed back to their home ports that included Windsor, Toledo, Detroit, Toronto and Collingwood Ontario on Georgian Bay. EYC members should be proud as our club received many accolades for our facilities and hospitality.

These 16 solo racers were quite a cast of characters/competitors as the race took 39 hours for the first boat, a 33' mono hull. But as the fleet spread out in the lighter winds and later mere zephyr conditions, the last boat finished in 91 hours! Just think, just shy of four days alone on a boat, racing. When was the last time you were alone anywhere for four days? Despite the lower wind conditions for this year's event that was a complete turnaround from the wet, wild and windy 2009 bob sled ride, almost all agreed that the 2010 edition was a wonderful enjoyable sail with clear skies and bright moon lit nights. It was quite a contrast from the 2009 race where the same boat averaged 10.6 mph for 29 ½ hours to win 1st overall.

One might guess from its title that this event is much more than a race, it is a mental and physical test that very few are willing to attempt. It takes a great deal of preparation and perseverance to complete this tenacious trial. Hats off to those who have accepted and met the Lake Erie Solo Challenge!





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My 1949 Ford Convertible "that sweet little candy apple ragtop"

I's funny how certain things trigger old memories. Parked next to my truck in a supermarket parking lot recently was a bright shiny convertible decked out in candy apple red paint. It wasn't so much the slick new car but the deep metallic red paint that took me back to 1957 and my 49 Ford ragtop that was the pride of my teenage years. That little bomb had the lines of a shoebox but it was the candy apple paint that made it so special. It all brought back the summer when my old Ford got its custom paint job. The hood was molded in and all the chrome was stripped off, and the bumpers were replanted with 53 Plymouth custom jobs. The time finally came when I had saved enough for a real paint job at Banka's Auto Body on East 9th Street. Actually I hadn't saved very much but Frank Banka was known as a pushover for a kid with an old car but little money. The best part was that Frank was a master at his trade and did the best auto painting in town. When I asked Frank if he had candy-apple red, he just smiled and said, "There's no color that I can't mix but here's the deal kid, you have to do all the prep work, if you want a fancy color like that." That didn't sound too bad until I found out just what the prep work consisted of. First I had to wet sand every inch by hand. Then came several coats of primer and more sanding between each coat. Then came the work of: taping, tack ragging, and air cleaning, to remove all dust. The air hose was also used to remove dirt from under the trim. It took an entire Saturday to do everything Frank insisted on. Finally he told me to pull the car into the spray booth and wet down the floor to reduce dust. I watched with great anticipation as Frank finally filled the spray gun and donned his painter's mask. My heart raced as I watched the master painter test the nozzle with a few short blasts. This car was sure to be the envy of all my motorhead buddies. Wait 'til they see my custom machine. I even had a new set of Full Moon hubcaps for the finishing touch. Frank was a big guy with the arms and shoulders of a wrestler, but as the cloud of red mist flowed from the sprayer onto the little Ford, Frank glided over and around the car with the grace of a ballet dancer and the skill of an accomplished



craftsman. A good painter must use flowing strokes that evenly mist the car so that the paint doesn't run. Frank was an artist at his trade, but there was something wrong - the paint seemed transparent. It wasn't bright red, and the black primer was still very visible. When he turned off the sprayer I asked him why it looked that way and he just shook his head. "Don't worry son," he said, "that's only the first coat and that paint will take at least five or six coats. You might as well go home and come back Monday." That night I had trouble sleeping. All I could think about was my cool little rod. They were the kind of dreams kids have on Christmas Eve, and this special gift was something I had dreamed of for a long time, and the benefits would be awesome. There was little doubt - at least in my mind - that the girls at school would be standing in line for rides home, and begging me to put the top down. Then I would crank up the flathead mill and rap off the dual pipes just for effect. Everyone near the school parking lot would know that I had the meanest rod at East High School. Even the jocks with the letter sweaters would be green with envy. The next morning, while walking home from Sunday church with my friend Gary, we stopped by the body shop, but the place was locked up tight, and we couldn't even find a window to get a glimpse of my car. Then we noticed a row of high windows in the area of the paint shop. My friend hoisted me up onto a low roof so I could peer in. I wiped off the dirty windowpane and squinted in at the dimly lighted room. There it was, glowing like a big ruby, as it reflected the sunlight from a single light shaft that streamed in from a south window. Even with the chrome still taped, and windows covered with newspaper, it looked fantastic. The dream may be even better than I had imagined. The year that followed turned out to be one of my best my teenage years: thanks to a kindly body shop guy named Frank, lots of hard work with my friends at the pizza shop and that beautiful little candy apple Ford ragtop that I'll never forget.



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Erio's Proud Naval Tradition:

Vice Admiral Thomas Weschler

The first time that I met Admiral Weschler occurred when I was a guest speaker at the American Sail Training Association's annual summer bash in Newport, Rhode Island. When I finished my remarks, a distinguished looking gentleman approached the podium and thanked me for my speech. There was something special about this man in which he exuded a strong sense of presence that commanded respect. Only later that evening did I discover that this gentleman was Vice Admiral Thomas Weschler, the highest ranked admiral that Erie has ever produced, and an international leader in the tall ship community. Through the subsequent years, I have come to know Admiral Weschler and his wife Katrina (Quinn) quite well. They are regular fixtures of the Newport social and sailing scenes, and even at 93 years old, the Admiral maintains a busy schedule of meet-

ings, parties, and engagements. Born and raised in Erie, Tom Weschler graduated from Cathedral Prep and later the United States Naval Academy in 1939. He first worked aboard the aircraft carrier USS Wasp before moving to the Pacific-based Destroyer fleet, partaking in almost every landing of the 3rd, 5th, and 7th fleets. Weschler then attended MIT, where he earned a MSEE in missile guidance.

After duty in cruisers and battleships and a brief tour in the Korean War, Weschler became the personal aide to the Chief of Naval Operations, Admiral Arleigh Burke.

Weschler also served on a guided missile cruiser as XO before putting in three years with the Polaris Missile submarine program as the head of fire control and guidance. After

further study, he joined the Pacific Amphibious Force for four years. Here, he commanded the USS Montrose.

Weschler had an opportunity to help produce the next generation of destroyers and so designed the SPRUANCE class destroyer. A subsequent return to Newport saw him command a destroyer flotilla and later a Cruiser Destroyer Force-US Atlantic Fleet. Selected for his third admiral star in that position, he and his family moved to Washington, D.C. for a final tour as the Director, Logistics Joint Staff, JCS.

Weschler then returned to Newport with Trina in order to become the Director of Continuing Education at the U.S. Naval War College, and then the Director of Operations for the college. Both he and his wife served on the boards of many organizations in Newport, with Admiral Weschler becoming particularly interested in tall ships. He has been involved with the international tall ships festivals in Newport from 1976 until 2007, always in a key leaderby Calib "Cal" Pifer

ship position. His involvement with the ships, including Erie's own Flagship Niagara, has led to the Admiral becoming well known in tall ship circles around the country. In fact, when a person mentions that they are involved with tall ships in Newport, they are often greeted with the response "Well, you must know the

Weschler is currently the Chairman Emeritus of the Oliver Hazard Perry Foundation, a group that is building a reproduction of the HMS Detroit which fought against the Niagara in the Battle of Lake Erie. When completed, the ship will be one of the largest ships to sail under a U.S. flag.

Another interesting connection between Perry and Weschler goes back to the statue of Perry located on Perry's Square. The statue that commemorates Perry is exactly the same as its counterpart in Newport. Working in conjunction with Frank Zurn and Tom Hagen, Admiral Weschler facilitated the copying of the dye in Newport and brought the statue to Erie in the 1980s.

The Weschlers are proud parents of two children, five grandchildren and two great grandchildren. Even after seventy years of living away from Erie, the Weschlers make it a point to visit every summer for the traditional Quinn family get-together and BBQ. When the Admiral speaks about Erie, it's with enthusiasm in his voice and a smile on his face. 

If I am selected by the membership I will work diligently to accomplish this task.




GREG GORNY
